### ***A message from the Chief of Police:***

In addition to the typical information found in our quarterly report this quarter we highlight our progress thus far on our Division Goals and Objectives.

We have made much progress on our goal to improve our readiness to respond to critical incidents. All of our supervisors have been trained in the Incident Command System for handling critical incidents. Additionally, we have conducted a joint mock critical incident with other jurisdictions including Washington Township Fire Department. Finally, under this goal we have implemented a stand alone evidence collection vehicle to help us effectively process crime scenes as well as major accident scenes.

We continue to address traffic issues throughout the city and have targeted seven top accident locations for responses from not only the Police Division, but also our engineering department.

In the area of criminal activity we continue to implement anti-theft initiatives and are challenged by the ongoing thefts from vehicles occurring throughout the city.

As we look forward to the remainder of 2003 we are working on initiatives to help us in our stated Division Goals. We are currently working with our Public Information Officer to develop an education and awareness campaign aimed at reducing thefts from vehicles.

We also look forward to the implementation of our Traffic Enforcement Unit. This unit will be comprised of a Sergeant and four officers and will work on top accident locations as well as neighborhood speed complaint issues. This unit should be implemented in early fall and we expect them to be very successful.

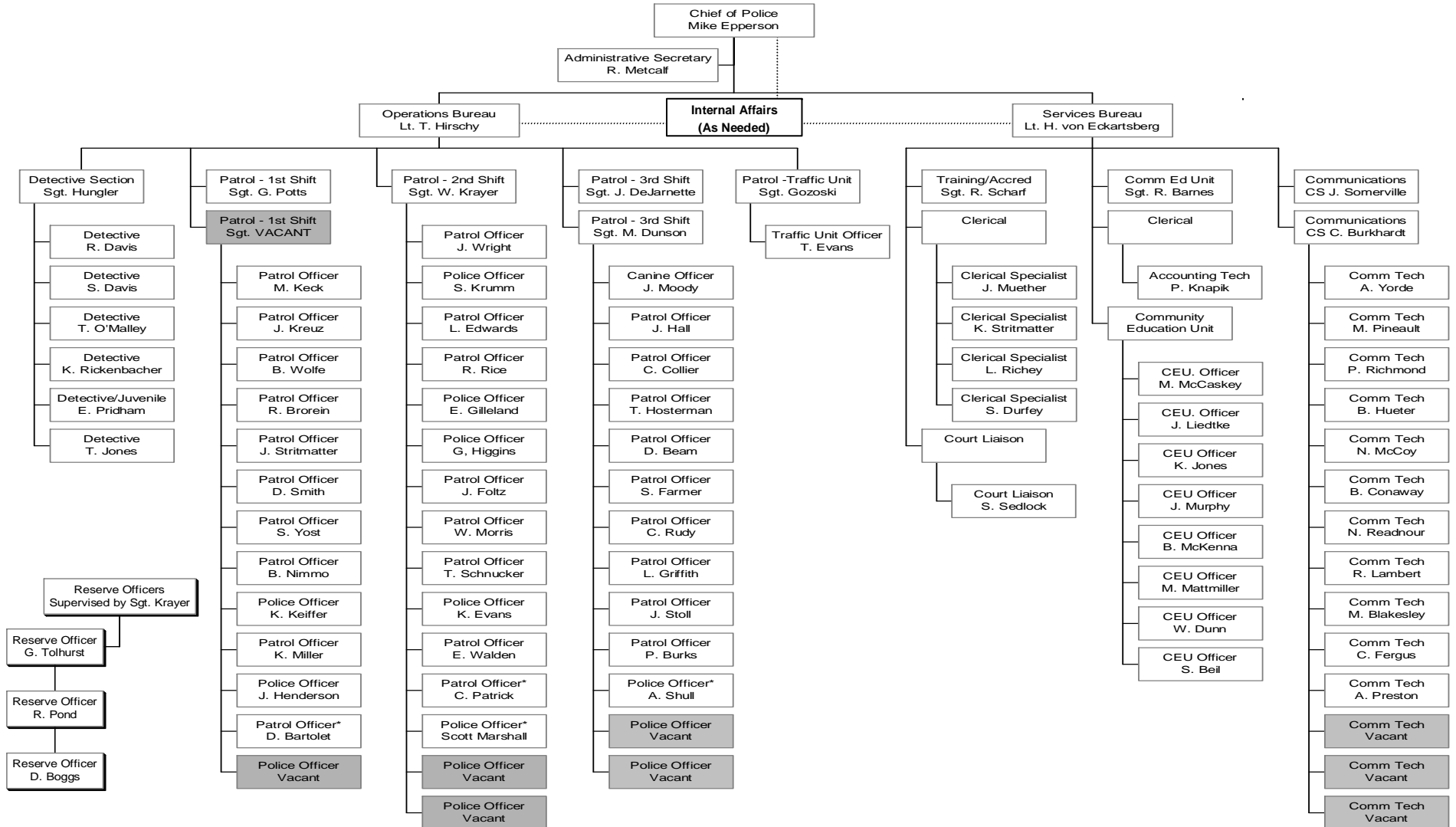

# DIVISION ACTIVITY

## Goals & Objectives Progress

1

*Reduce the number of vehicular accidents occurring in the city below 2002 statistics.*

### **OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2003-101** Reduce the number of accidents occurring in high accident locations.

**Pending:** Overall, the city has experienced 459 traffic crashes in the first half of 2003. This represents a 2% increase in traffic crashes compared with the first half of 2002. The top seven traffic enforcement areas were re-adjusted during the second quarter of 2003 in an attempt to guide officers' traffic enforcement efforts in the top seven traffic crash locations during the morning, lunch and evening rush hours. Due to the changes and modifications in the top seven traffic crash and traffic enforcement areas, it is difficult to obtain an accurate reflection of traffic enforcement efforts to reduce traffic crashes in the top seven areas. However, a raw number analysis reflects that traffic crashes in the top seven areas has increased 4% in 2003 compared with 2002.

- **2003-102** Perform targeted enforcement in high accident locations.

**Pending:** Both first and second shift patrol continue to actively utilize traffic enforcement as a means to reduce traffic crashes. Consistently, both patrol shifts have performed targeted enforcement in the top seven traffic crash locations. Approximately 50% of all traffic stops and traffic citations issued have occurred in the top seven traffic crash locations.

- **2003-103** Identify traffic engineering suggestions and other non-enforcement related initiatives to reduce accidents.

**Pending:** The Patrol Section for the Dublin Division of Police has issued several traffic engineering requests and recommendations concerning the area of Avery Road and US Route 33. Patrol Officers are encouraged to identify traffic-engineering suggestions and other non-enforcement related initiatives to reduce traffic crashes. The following have been deployed in an attempt to reduce traffic crashes: speed trailers and decoy vehicles.

*Reduce the number of property crimes occurring in the city below 2002 statistics.*

### **SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2003-201** Link crime prevention education efforts to crime analysis data to reduce targeted crimes.

**In Progress:** Officers attended three neighborhood watch meetings at which time they addressed thefts from vehicles occurring throughout the city and ways to prevent becoming a victim of this crime.

### ***OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-202** Reduce the number of thefts from vehicles occurring in the City of Dublin.

**Pending:** For the first half of 2003, the Dublin Police received 154 theft from vehicle reports, which is an increase of 14% from the first half of 2002.

- **2003-203** Proactively respond to crime trends through enforcement and other non-traditional methods.

**Pending:** The Dublin Division of Police continues to utilize preventive patrol, theft prevention notices, and surveillance as a means to reduce or prevent thefts from vehicles. For the first half of 2003, the Dublin Police conducted 5,543 business checks, issued 3,744 theft prevention notices, and performed 1,439 specialized patrols.

***Develop functional integration of technology to improve operational efficiency and effectiveness.***

### ***SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-301** Design and implement public portals via the Police Division's web page to obtain information from the Division of Police (ie: report forms, incident reports, accident reports, crime data, etc.)

**In Progress:** The Division of Police and Division of Information Technology are working together to make this information available on the Dublin website.

- **2003-302** Successfully implement the Opticom system in front line cruisers.

**In Progress:** The system is scheduled to be installed on front line cruisers in November 2003. The first test area is the Avery-Muirfield Drive corridor.

### ***OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-303** Implement field reporting project during 2003.

**Pending:** The field reporting project is on stand-by due to the mobile data browser issue. Information Technology has planned to implement the field reporting project and the mobile data browser at the same time.

- **2003-304** Implement pilot project of internet reporting during 2003.

**Pending:** Internet reporting has been given a lower priority than other technology projects and will be revisited during the last quarter of 2003.

- **2003-305** Implement usable crime analysis software during 2003.

**Pending:** GIS is working with an outside vendor to modify their parcel database in order for it to accept the police geo-code files. The current hit rate between our Records Management System and GIS is 61%. The goal is to improve the hit rate to 90%.

***Improve Division of Police readiness to respond to critical incidents.***

***SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-401** Plan and carry out at least one critical incident/disaster exercise involving local and regional resources.

**Accomplished:** The Division of Police in conjunction with the Washington Township Fire Department and Franklin County EMA conducted a mock disaster/critical incident drill on June 20, 2003.

***OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-403** Implement evidence collection vehicle during 2003.

**Accomplished:** Truck 9 is a fully outfitted crime scene and traffic crash investigation vehicle.

- **2003-404** Participate in a mock critical incident during 2003.

**Accomplished:** On June 20, 2003, several members participated in the mock critical incident exercise. The final debriefing and exercise evaluation is pending.

- **2003-405** Implement better officer safety equipment for quad response during 2003.

**Pending:** We are currently evaluating safety equipment to be used for a quad response. This equipment includes ballistic vests and helmets.

- **2003-406** Evaluate participation in a regional tactical unit.

**Pending:** No action taken on this objective.

- **2003-407** Attendance of field supervisors to an incident command course during 2003.

**Accomplished:** All field supervisors were trained in the basic Incident Command System.

*Provide effective community education initiatives to help accomplish division goals.*

#### ***SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-501** Design and implement public portals via the Police Division's web page to obtain information from the Division of Police (ie: report forms, incident reports, accident reports, crime data, etc.)

**In Progress:** The Division of Police and Division of Information Technology are working together to make this information available on the Dublin website.

- **2003-502** Target Division recruitment efforts towards police officers and communications technicians, (with an emphasis on minority recruiting) in an effort to increase minority, police officer, and communications technicians applications

**In Progress:** The first half of the year the Division has made progress in our recruitment efforts. Sgt. Scharf was interviewed on WVKO radio regarding recruitment of minorities; the Division participated in the Ohio Public Safety Job Fair and has applied to participate in Cleveland State's Job Fair later this year.

#### ***OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES***

- **2003-503** Implement proactive strategies of communicating crime prevention information to our community.

**Pending:** Currently, the Division of Police is working with our community relations division to implement a major media campaign on crime and traffic issues to include: theft stickers, theft brochures, and a public information campaign.

# DIVISION ACTIVITY

## CALLS FOR SERVICE

### District 1

Includes all areas within the city limits that are south and east of Interstate 270 and west of the Scioto River. Also includes I270 northbound from US 33 westbound ramp up to Sawmill Road.

### District 2

Includes all areas within the city limits that are east of the Scioto River, west of Sawmill Road, south of the Delaware County Line and north of Martin Road. Also includes I270 westbound from Sawmill Road to US 33 and the ramp from I270 southbound to US 33 westbound.

### District 3

Includes all areas within the city limits that are north of Brand Road and west of the Scioto River. All addresses that are within the city limits on Brand Road including the intersections of Brand Road/Muirfield Drive and Brand Road/Dublin Road are covered by this district.

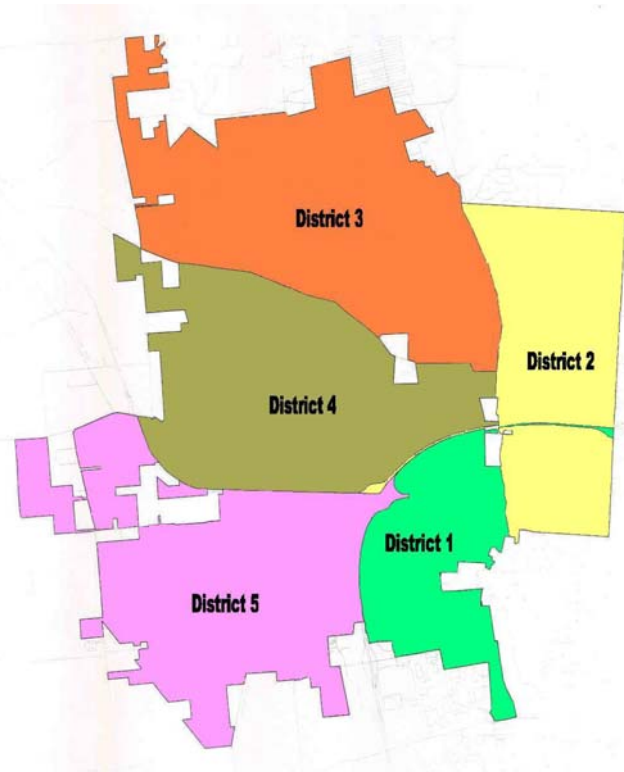
### District 4

This district includes all areas within the city limits that are south of Brand Road, north of US 33 and west of Interstate I270, Browning Court and Dublin Road. Addresses that are south of Brand Road to the I270 overpass that are within the city limits are part of District 4.

### District 5

This area includes all areas within the city limits that are south of the north edge of US 33 and west of I270. This area also covers both northbound and southbound lanes of I270 between Tuttle Crossing and US 33 and all ramps to and from I270 south of US 33.

**NOTE:** The following is a breakdown of calls for service. They represent initial reports. The number of actual offenses may be different after officer's investigation.



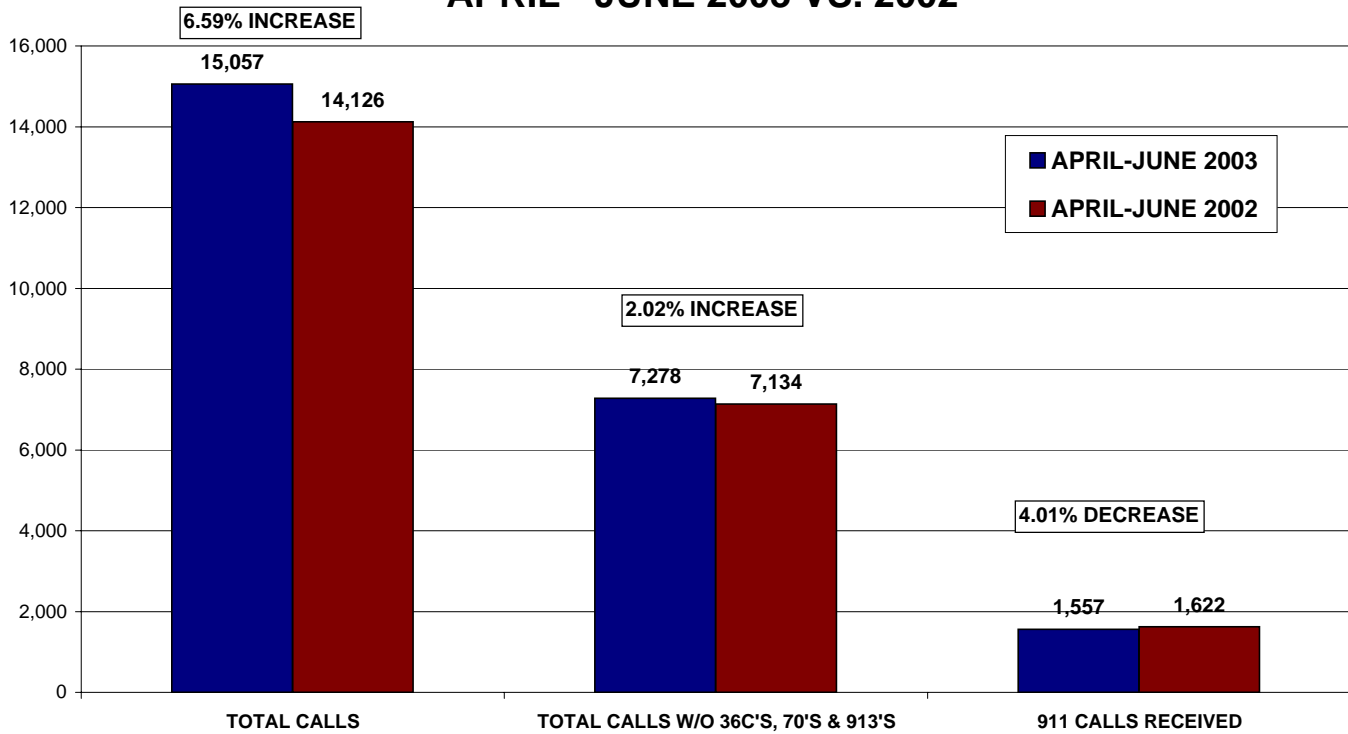

# WORKLOAD ANALYSIS

## April - June 2003

The April through June 2003 Workload Analysis reflects a total of 6,997 calls for service. This figure does not include traffic stops, foot patrols or courtesy cards initiated by officers or activity occurring in District 0 (calls outside city limits/mutual aid). The average response time for calls was six (6) minutes from the time the call was received by our communications technician until the first responding officer arrived on the scene. The average time to reach a disposition and clear the call was nineteen (19) minutes.

The Workload Analysis also allows us to track activity levels by hour by day. We analyze this data to determine our staffing levels for patrol shifts. By reviewing our Workload Analysis Graph on the following page, you can see that our busiest hour of activity was between 3:00 PM and 4:00 PM. Six hundred fifty-five (655) calls for service were received during this time frame. The next busiest hour was between 4:00 PM and 5:00 PM when five hundred thirty-five (535) calls for service were received. The ability to obtain this type of data is critical to effectively staff our patrol shifts.

While reviewing this activity it is important to note that various factors can influence average response times. "Stacking" of calls where lower priority calls are held so that calls of a more urgent nature can be dispatched and responded to commonly occurs. "Cross dispatching" where an officer is dispatched out of district to a call will also increase response time. Low priority calls that are received during roll call/shift change negate an immediate response from patrol officers thus increasing response times.

As a matter of practice, we like to keep our average response time for all calls occurring inside the City under ten (10) minutes. As previously stated, there are certain incidents where that becomes impossible. However, our goal is realistic and as demonstrated by the April through June 2003 report was met. The following is a break down of calls for service by district with the overall total calls, average response time and average time to resolve the call:

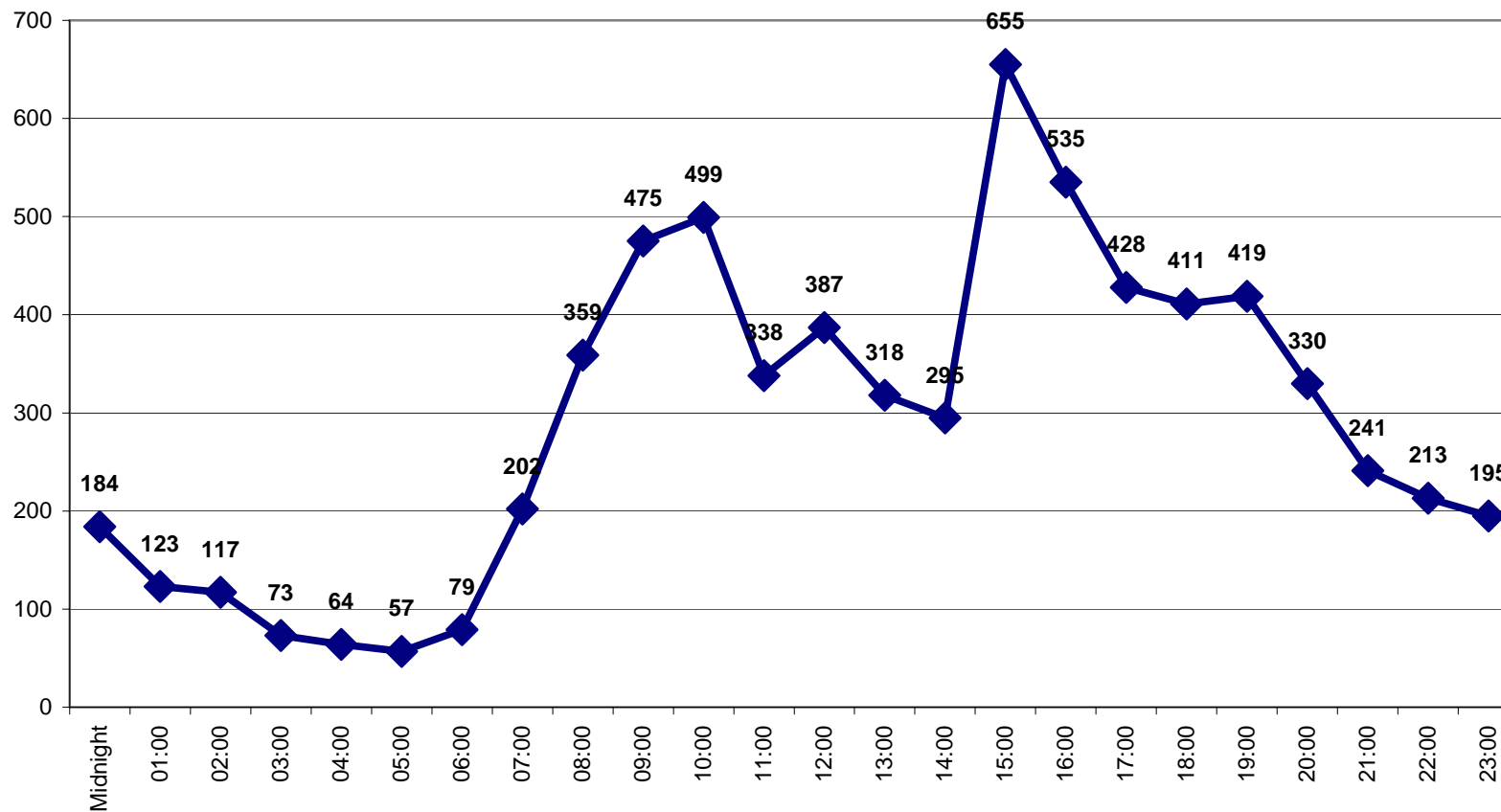

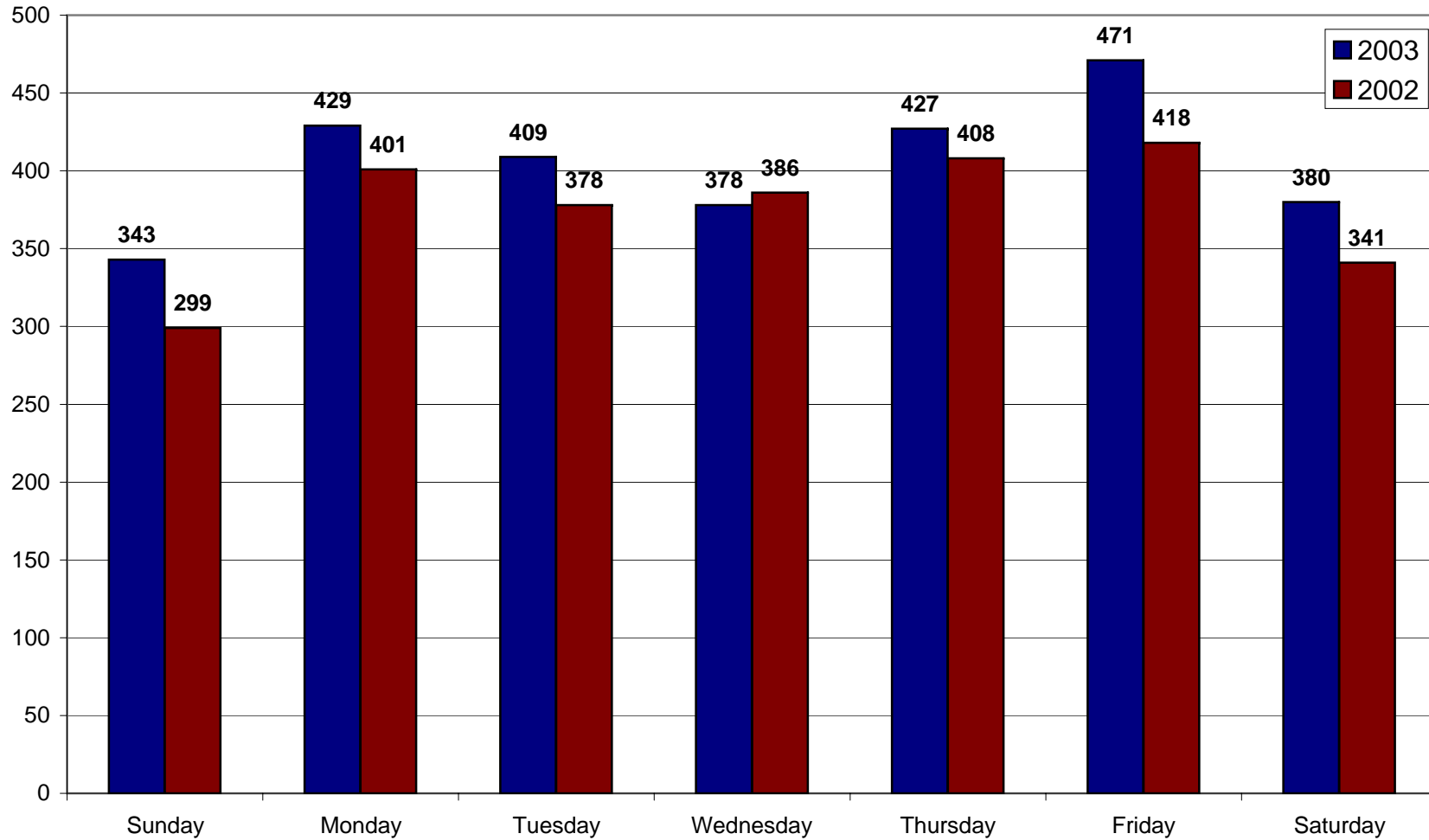

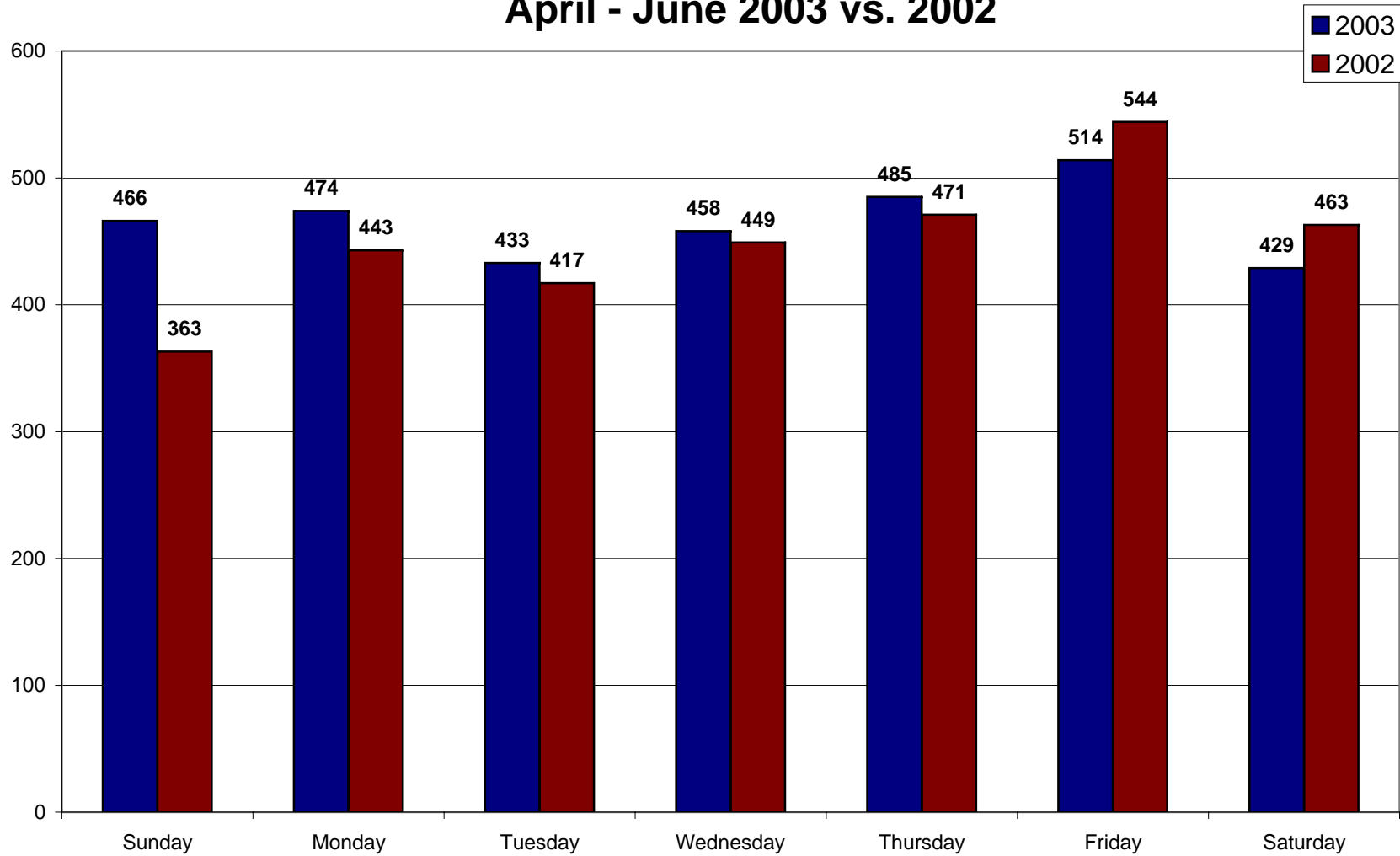

Experienced an overall increase of 7.83% in calls for service on 1st shift.

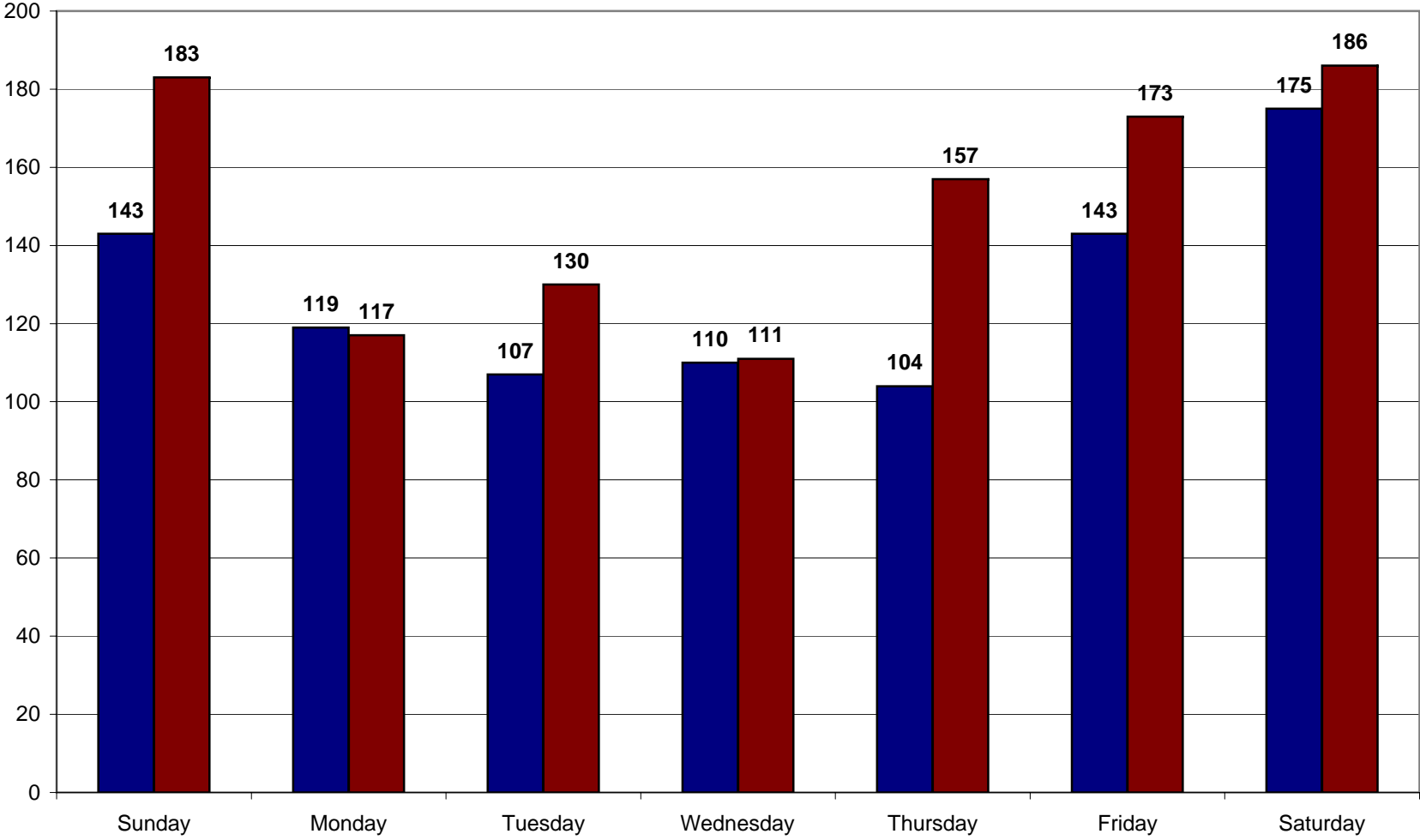
## Calls for Service - Second Shift April - June 2003 vs. 2002

## ACCIDENT ANALYSIS

### April – June 2003

April 1, 2003 through June 30, 2003 there were 237 reported traffic accidents, resulting in an average 2.60 accidents/day. Compared to 2002, accidents decreased 2.07% (2003 = 237; 2002 = 242).

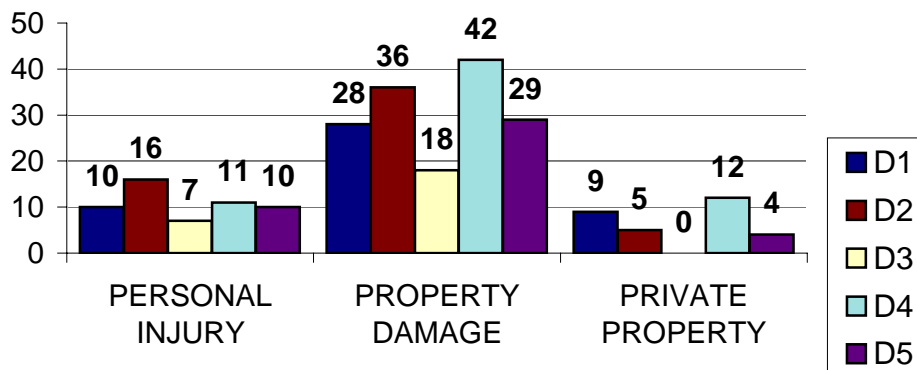
Personal injury accidents accounted for 54 (22.78%) of the total. Property damage accidents accounted for the majority of our activity with 153 reports (64.56%) being filed. Private property collisions accounted for 30 (12.66%) reports being filed.

District 4 experienced the majority of accidents (65 or 27.43%). The second district with the most activity was District 2 (57 accidents or 24.05%). There were 47 collisions in District 1 (19.83%), 25 collisions in District 3 (10.55%) and in District 5, 43 accidents (18.14%). The busiest day of the week for accident activity for the reporting period was Tuesday with 44 accidents (18.57%) reported. The second busiest day was Wednesday with 43 accidents (18.14%) reported. Accident activity for the remaining days of the week are as follows: Sunday = 13 (5.49%), Monday = 36 (15.19%); Thursday = 35 (14.76%); Friday = 37 (15.61%); and Saturday = 29 (12.24%).

The most frequent contributing factor was Following Too Closely which accounted for 72 or 30.38% of the accidents. The next most recurrent contributing factor was Failure to Yield accounting for 37 or 15.61% of the accidents for the reporting period.

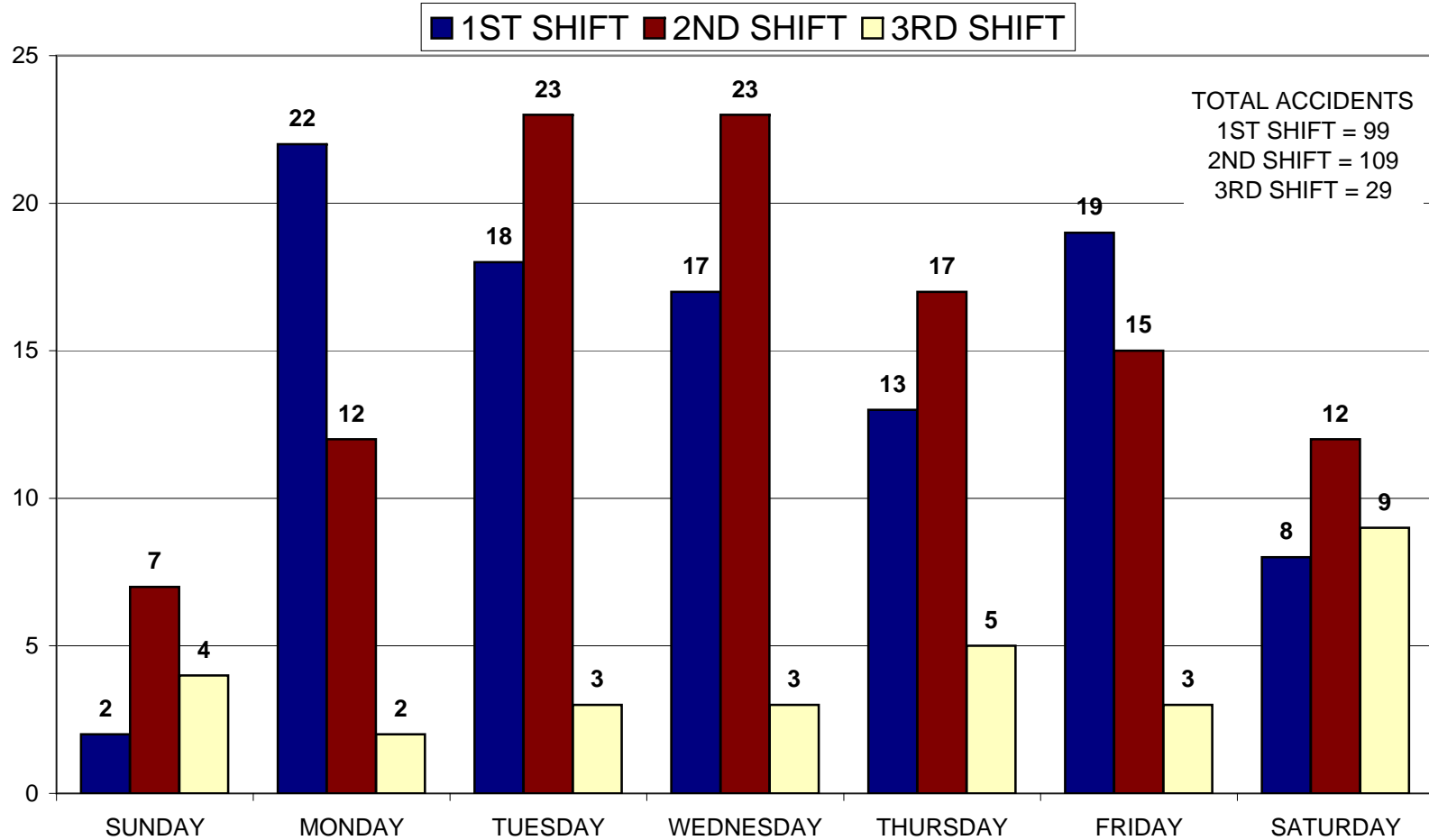

# ACCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK & SHIFT

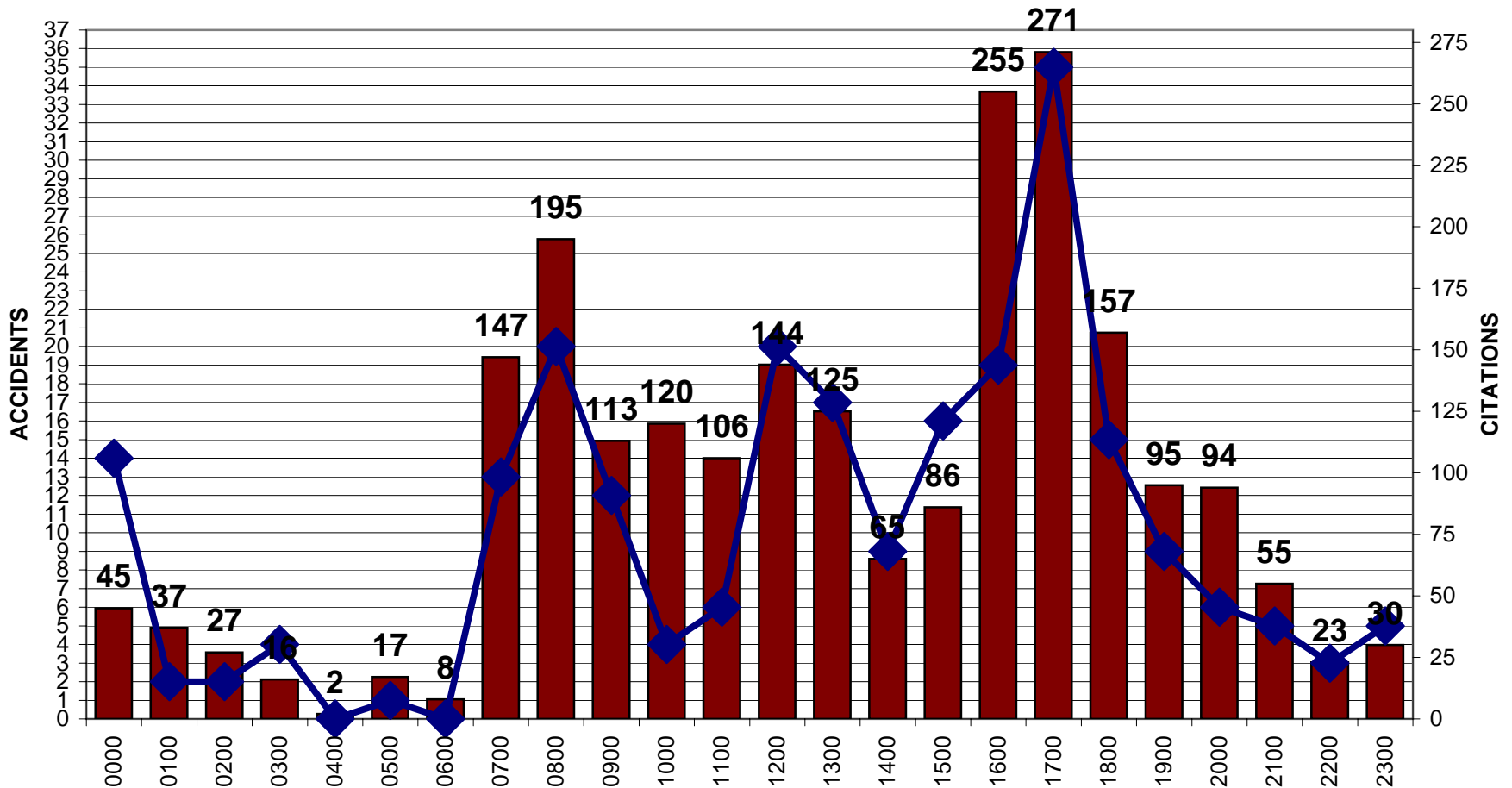

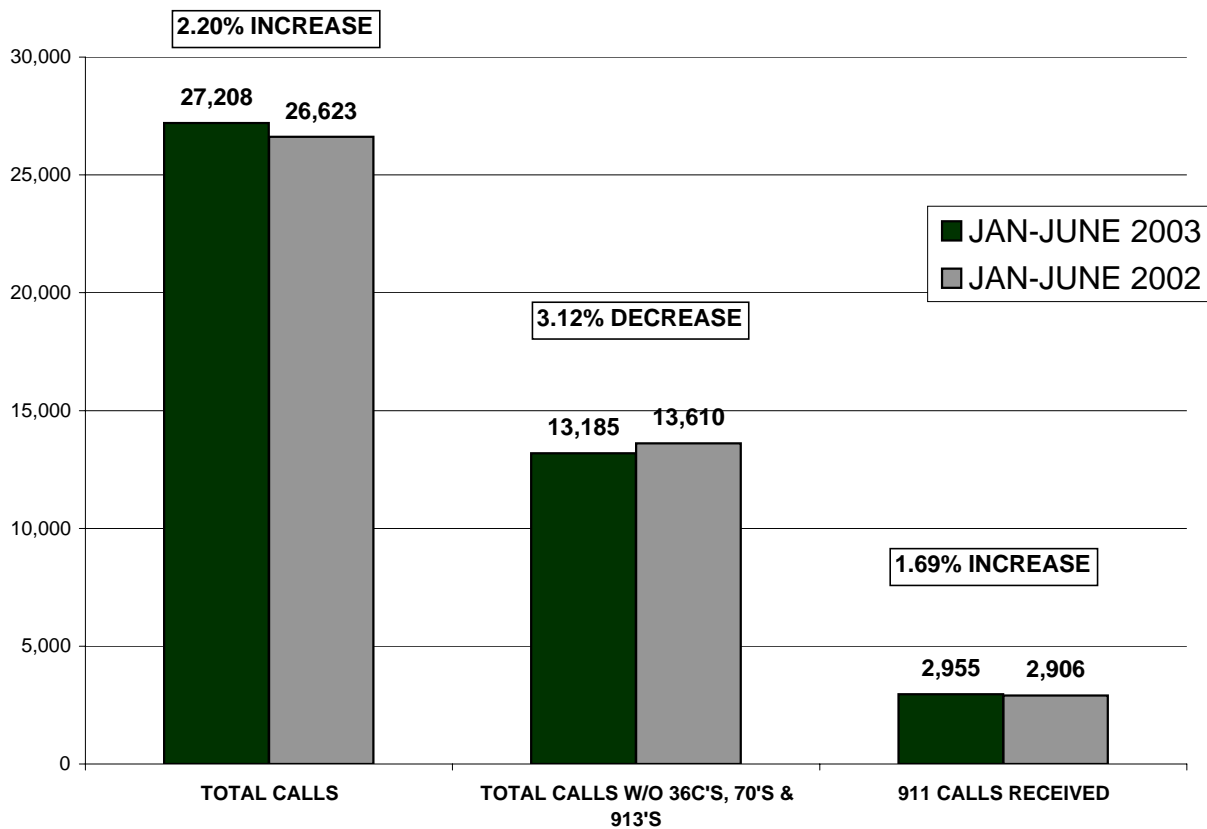

# WORKLOAD ANALYSIS REPORT

## January - June 2003

The January through June 2003 Workload Analysis reflects a total of 12,667 calls for service. This figure does not include traffic stops, foot patrols or courtesy cards initiated by officers or activity occurring in District 0 (calls outside city limits/mutual aid). The average response time for calls was six (6) minutes from the time the call was received by our communications technician until the first responding officer arrived on the scene. The average time to reach a disposition and clear the call was twenty (20) minutes.

The Workload Analysis also allows us to track activity levels by hour by day. We analyze this data to determine our staffing levels for patrol shifts. By reviewing our Workload Analysis Graph on the following page, you can see that our busiest hour of activity was between 3:00 PM and 4:00 PM. One thousand two hundred ninety-two (1,292) calls for service were received during this time frame. The next busiest hour was between 4:00 PM and 5:00 PM when one thousand forty-six (1,046) calls for service were received. The ability to obtain this type of data is critical to effectively staff our patrol shifts.

While reviewing this report it is important to note that various factors can influence average response times. "Stacking" of calls where lower priority calls are held so that calls of a more urgent nature can be dispatched and responded to commonly occurs. "Cross dispatching" where an officer is dispatched out of district to a call will also increase response time. Low priority calls that are received during roll call/shift change negate an immediate response from patrol officers thus increasing response times.

As a matter of practice, we like to keep our average response time for all calls occurring inside the City under ten (10) minutes. As previously stated, there are certain incidents where that becomes impossible. However, our goal is realistic and as demonstrated by the January through June 2003 report, was met. The following is a break down of calls for service by district with the overall total calls, average response time and average time to resolve the call:

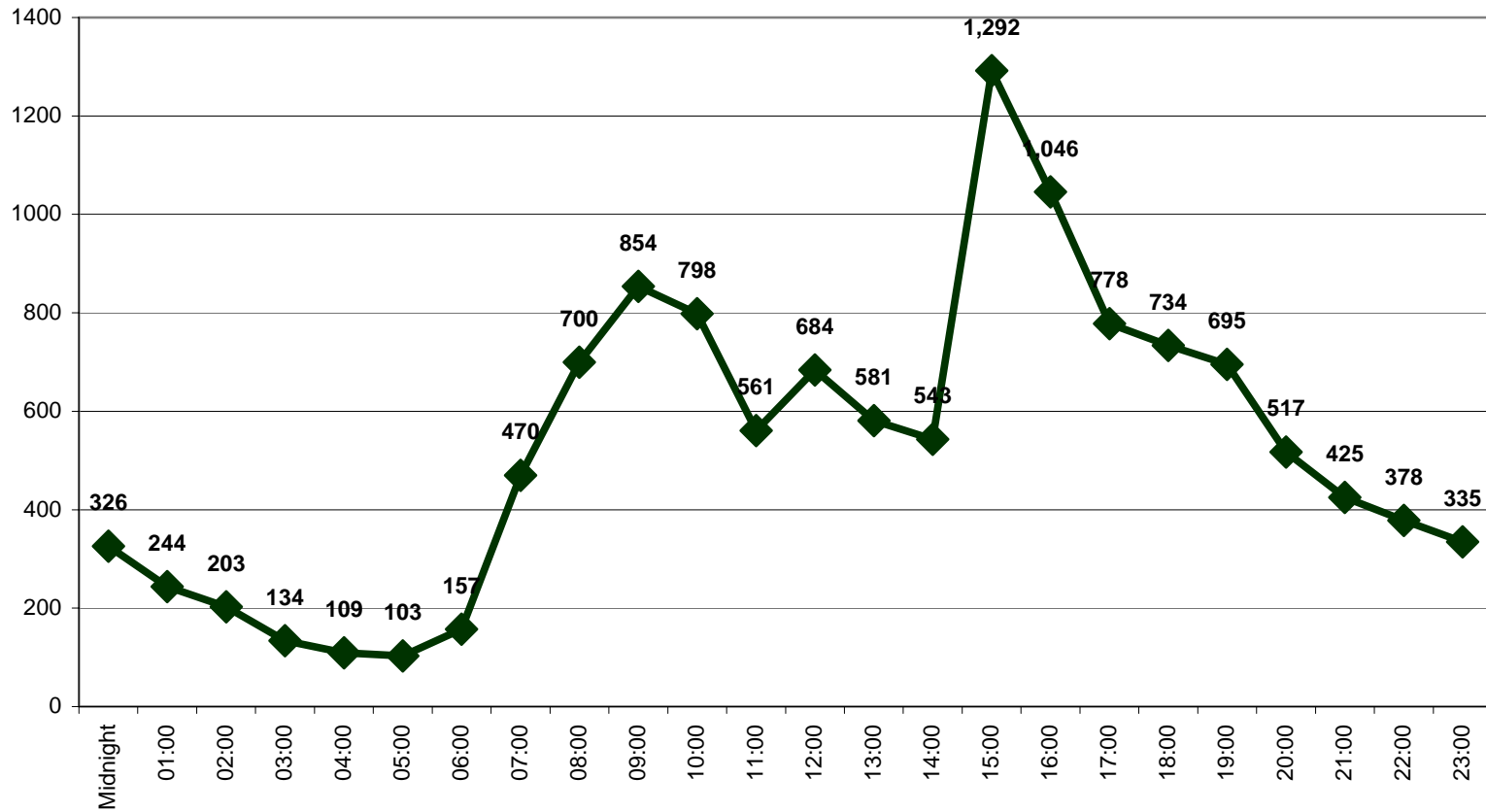

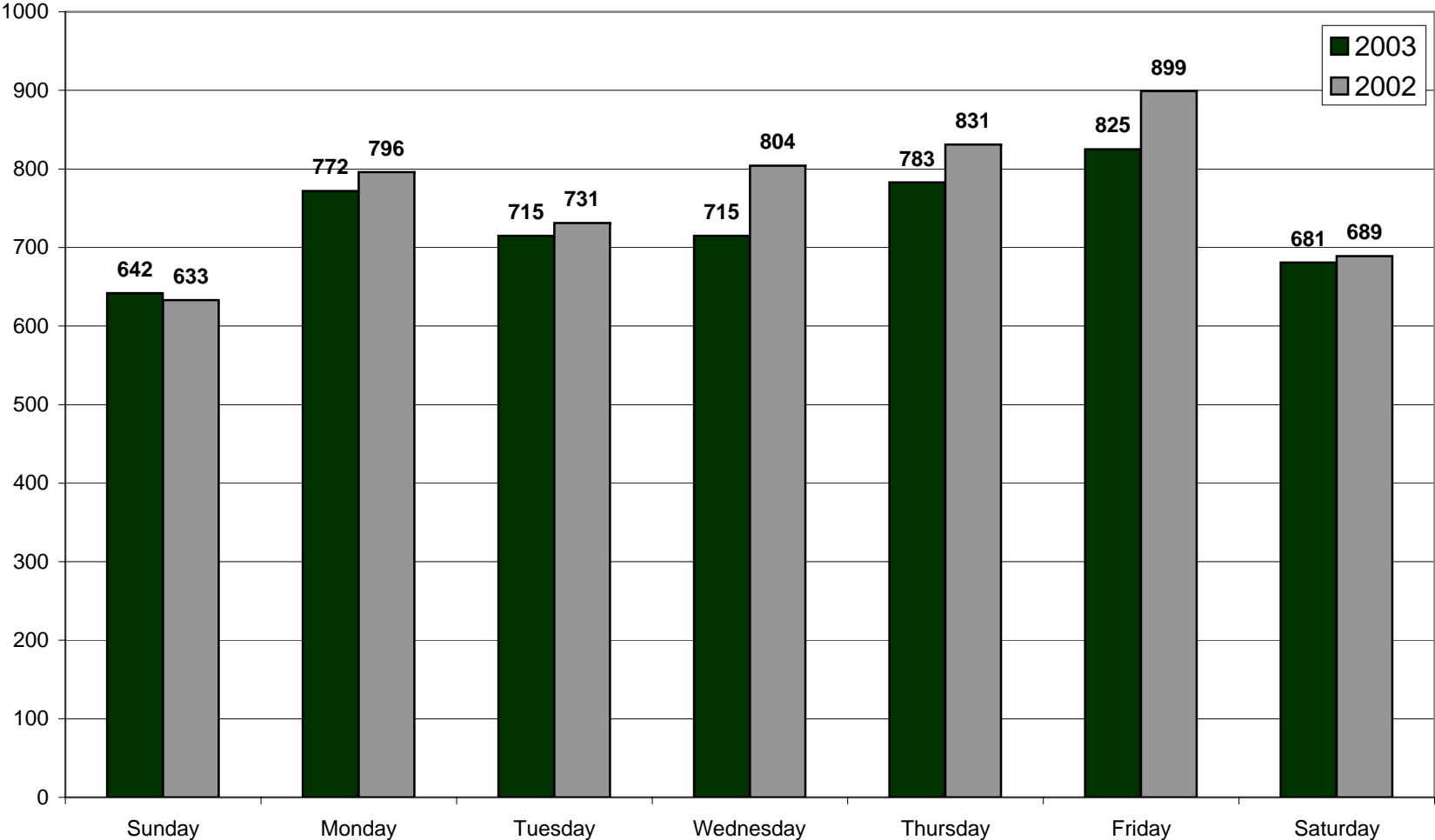

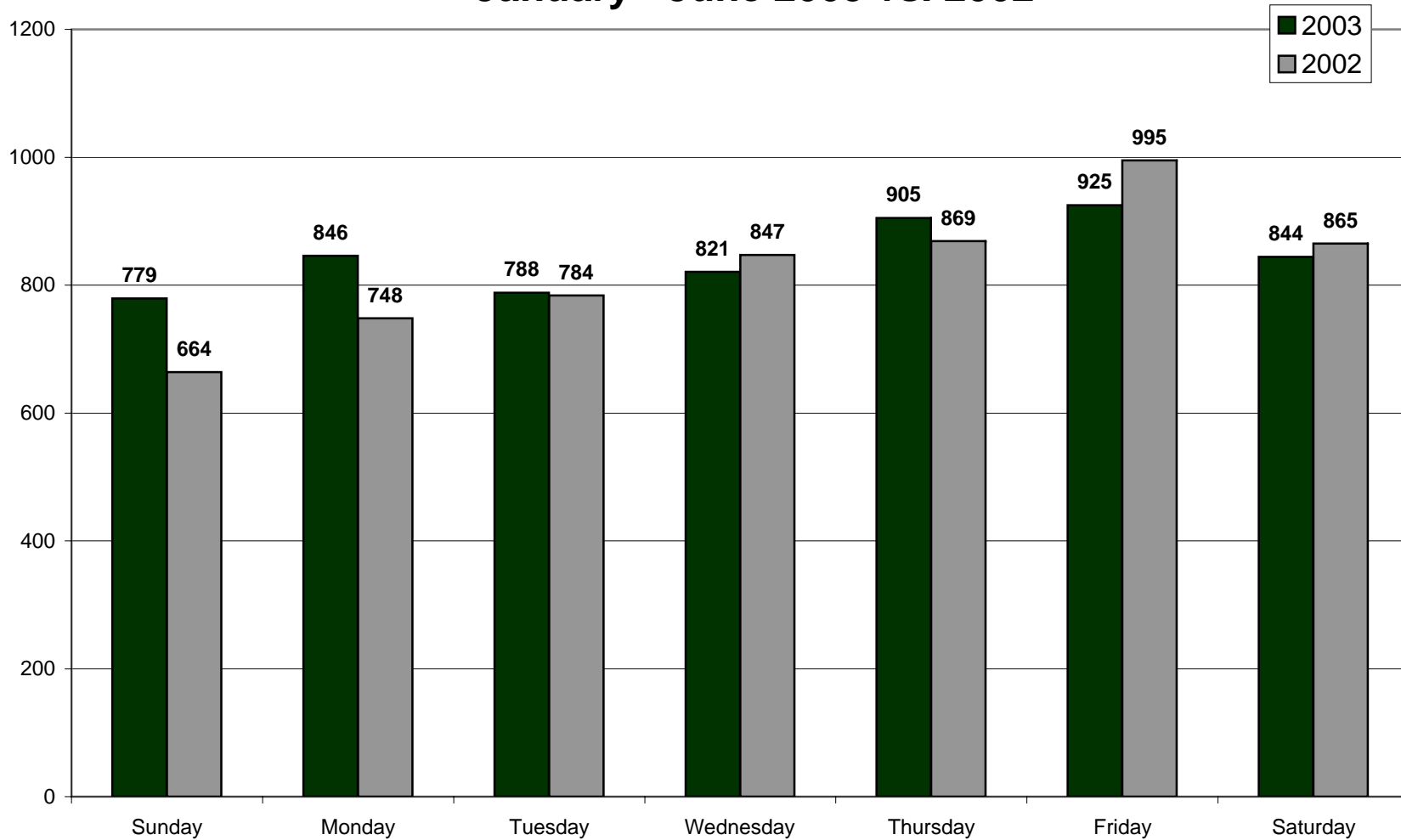

Experienced an overall decrease of 4.64% in calls for service on 1st shift.

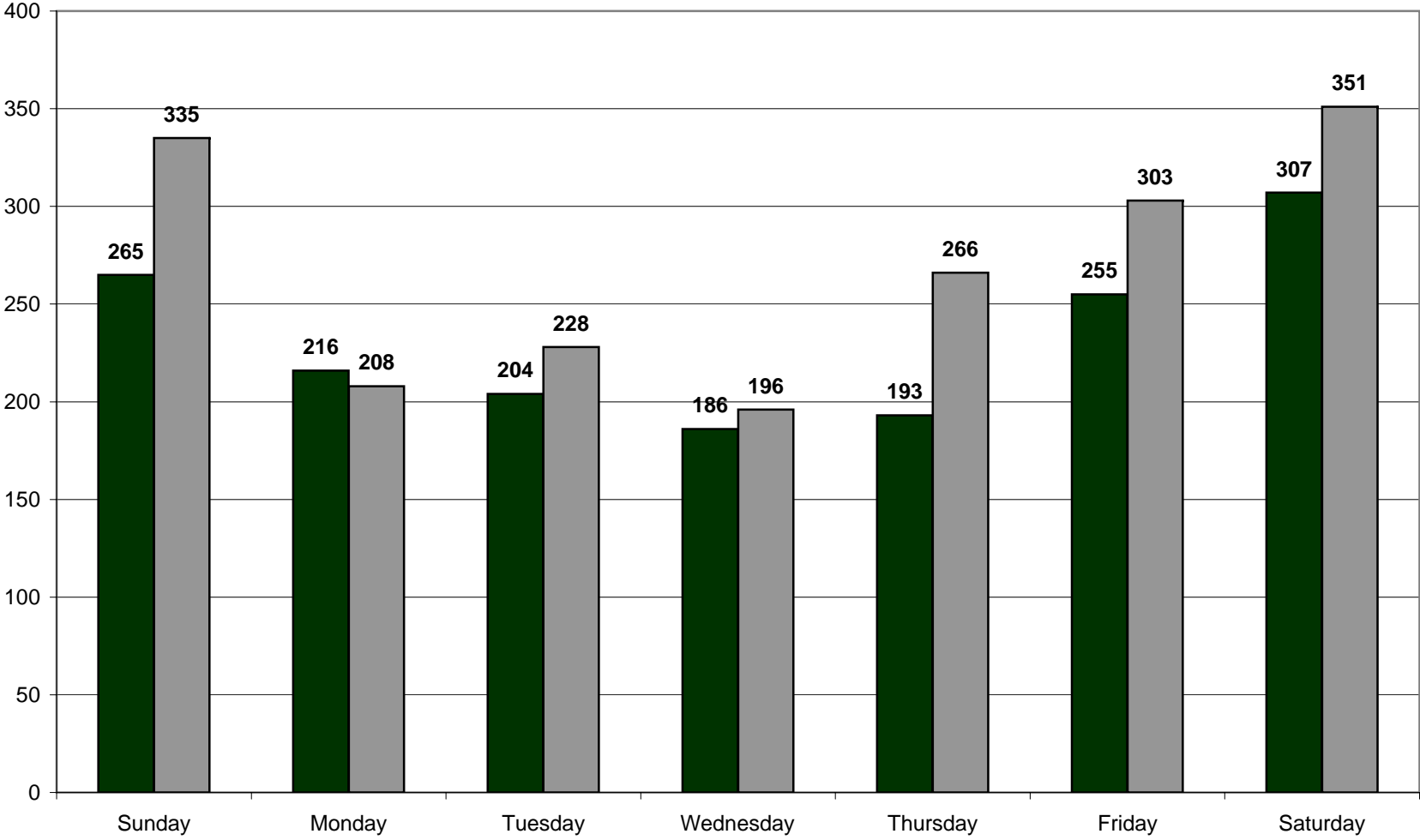
## Calls for Service - Second Shift January - June 2003 vs. 2002

## ACCIDENT ANALYSIS January – June 2003

January 1, 2003 through June 30, 2003 there were 459 reported traffic accidents, resulting in an average 2.54 accidents/day. Compared to 2002, accidents increased 2.23% (2003 = 459; 2002 = 449).

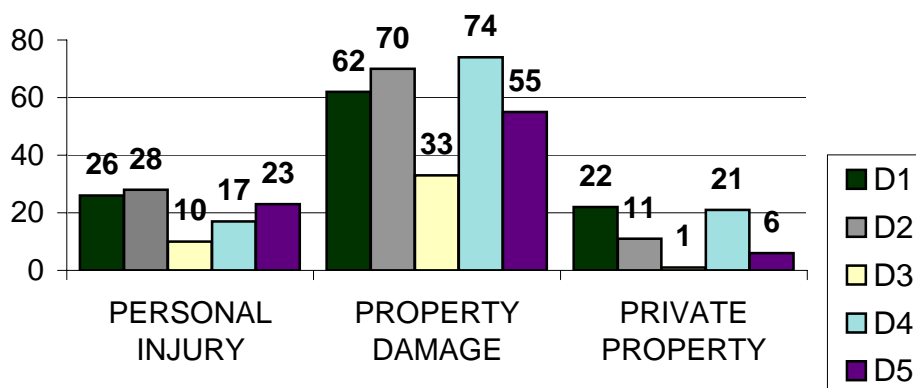
Personal injury accidents accounted for 104 (22.66%) of the total. Property damage accidents accounted for the majority of our activity with 294 reports (64.05%) being filed. Private property collisions accounted for 61 (13.29%) reports being filed.

District 4 experienced the majority of accidents (112 or 24.40%). The second district with the most activity was District 1 (110 accidents or 23.97%). There were 109 collisions in District 2 (23.75%), 44 collisions in District 3 (9.59%) and in District 5, 84 accidents (18.30%). The busiest day of the week for accident activity for the reporting period was Friday with 81 accidents (17.65%) reported. The second busiest day was tied between Tuesday and Wednesday with 79 accidents each (17.21% each) reported. Accident activity for the remaining days of the week are as follows: Sunday = 37 (8.06%), Monday = 63 (13.73%); Thursday = 70 (15.25%); and Saturday = 50 (10.89%).

The most frequent contributing factor was Following Too Closely which accounted for 124 or 27.01% of the accidents. The next most recurrent contributing factor was Failure to Yield accounting for 74 or 16.12% of the accidents for the reporting period.

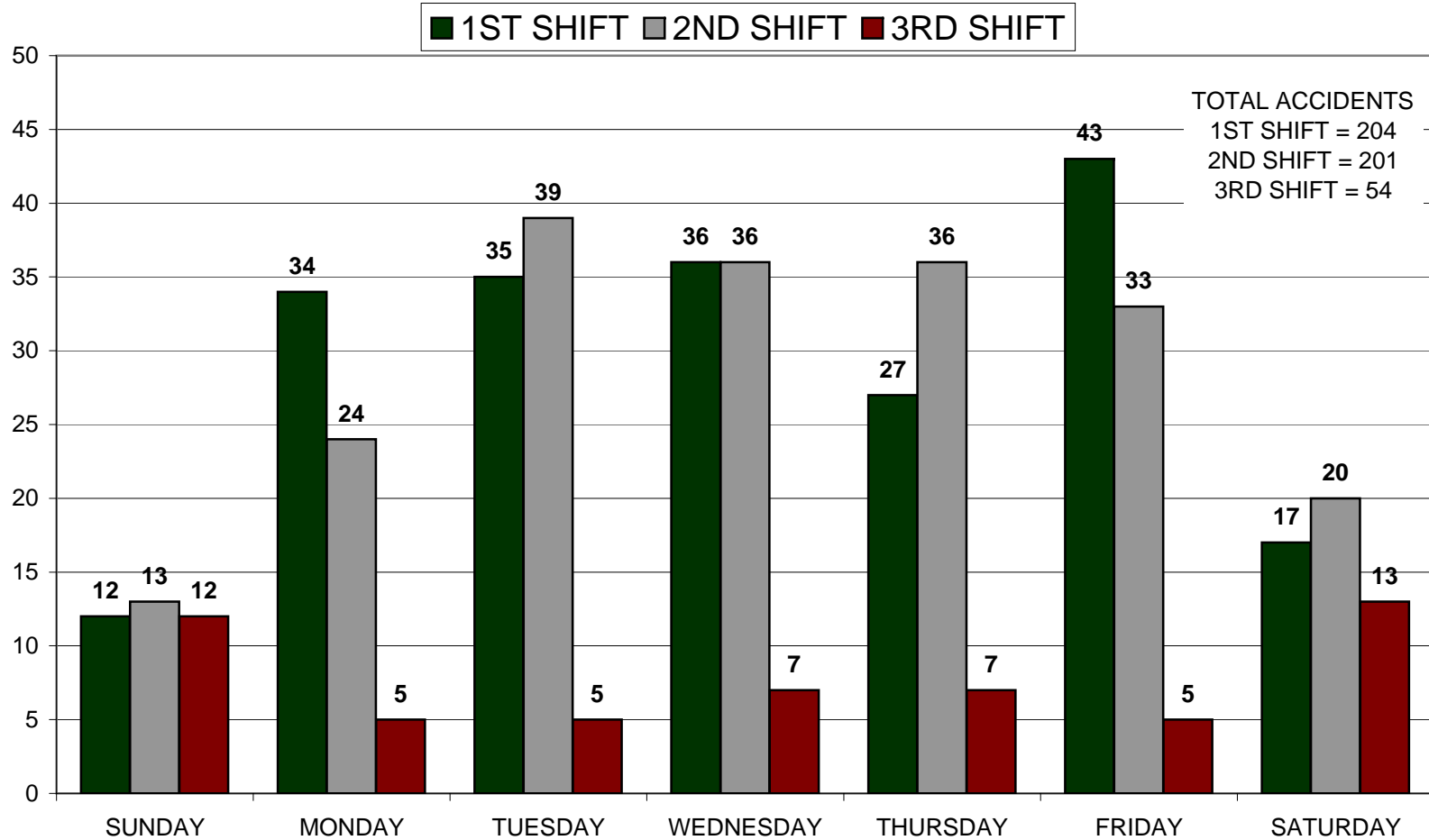
