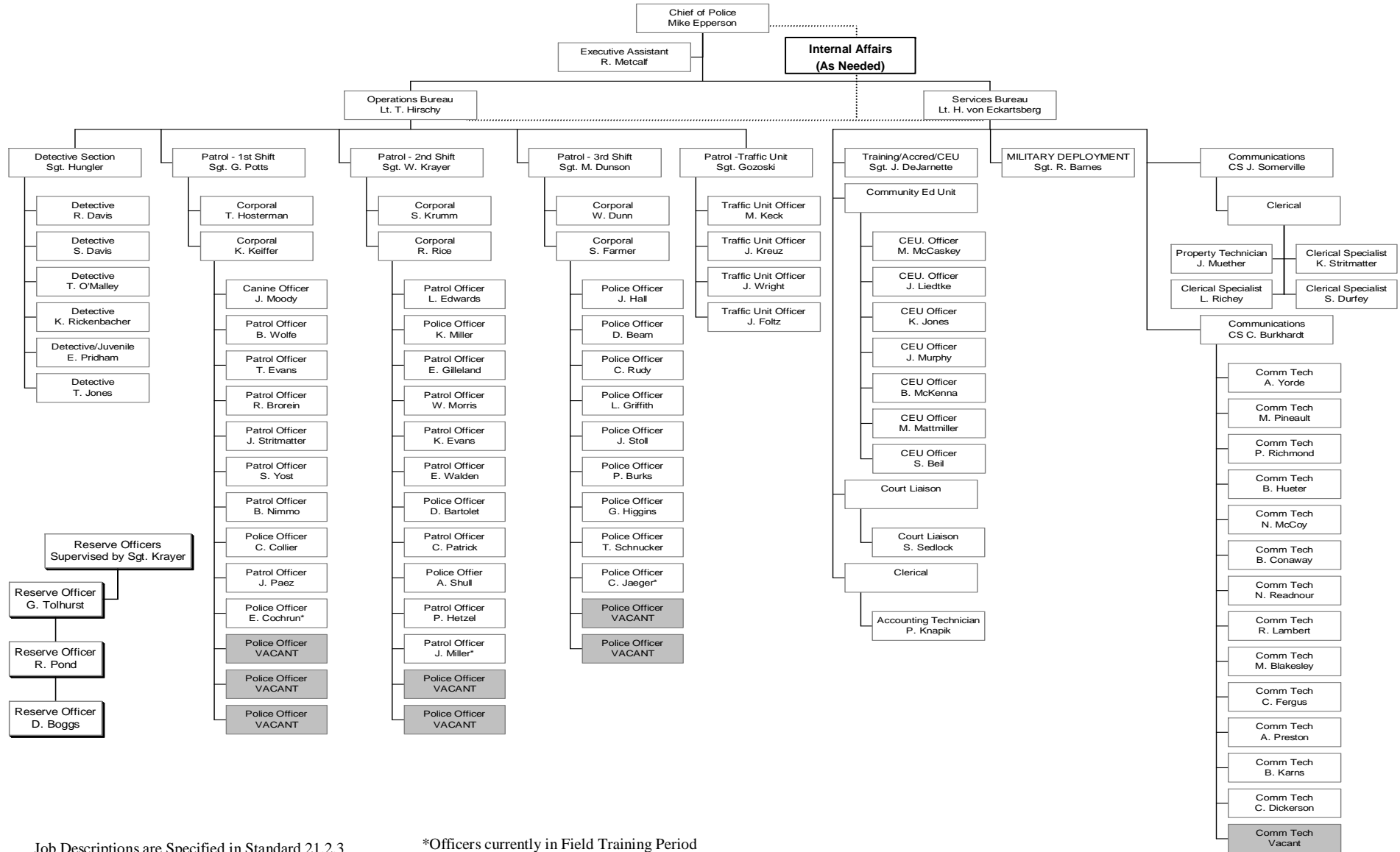

# WORKLOAD ANALYSIS REPORT

## April - June 2004

The April through June 2004 Workload Analysis Report reflects a total of 6,797 calls for service. This figure does not include traffic stops, foot patrols or courtesy cards initiated by officers or activity occurring in District 0 (calls outside city limits/mutual aid). The average response time for calls was five (5) minutes from the time the call was received by our communications technician until the first responding officer arrived on the scene. The average time to reach a disposition and clear the call was nineteen (19) minutes.

The Workload Analysis Report also allows us to track activity levels by hour by day. We analyze this data to determine our staffing levels for patrol shifts. By reviewing our Workload Analysis Chart on the following page, you can see that our busiest hour of activity was between 3PM and 4PM. Six hundred thirty (630) calls for service were received during this time frame. The next busiest hour was between 4PM and 5PM when five hundred ninety-four (594) calls for service were received. The ability to obtain this type of data is critical to effectively staff our patrol shifts.

While reviewing this report it is important to note that various factors can influence average response times. "Stacking" of calls where lower priority calls are held so that calls of a more urgent nature can be dispatched and responded to commonly occurs. "Cross dispatching" where an officer is dispatched out of district to a call will also increase response time. Low priority calls that are received during roll call/shift change negate an immediate response from patrol officers thus increasing response times.

As a matter of practice, we like to keep our average response time for all calls occurring inside the City under ten (10) minutes. As previously stated, there are certain incidents where that becomes impossible. However, our goal is realistic and as demonstrated by the April through June 2004 report was met. In an effort to assist the reader in reviewing the Workload Analysis Report the following is a list of some relevant interpretations for review.

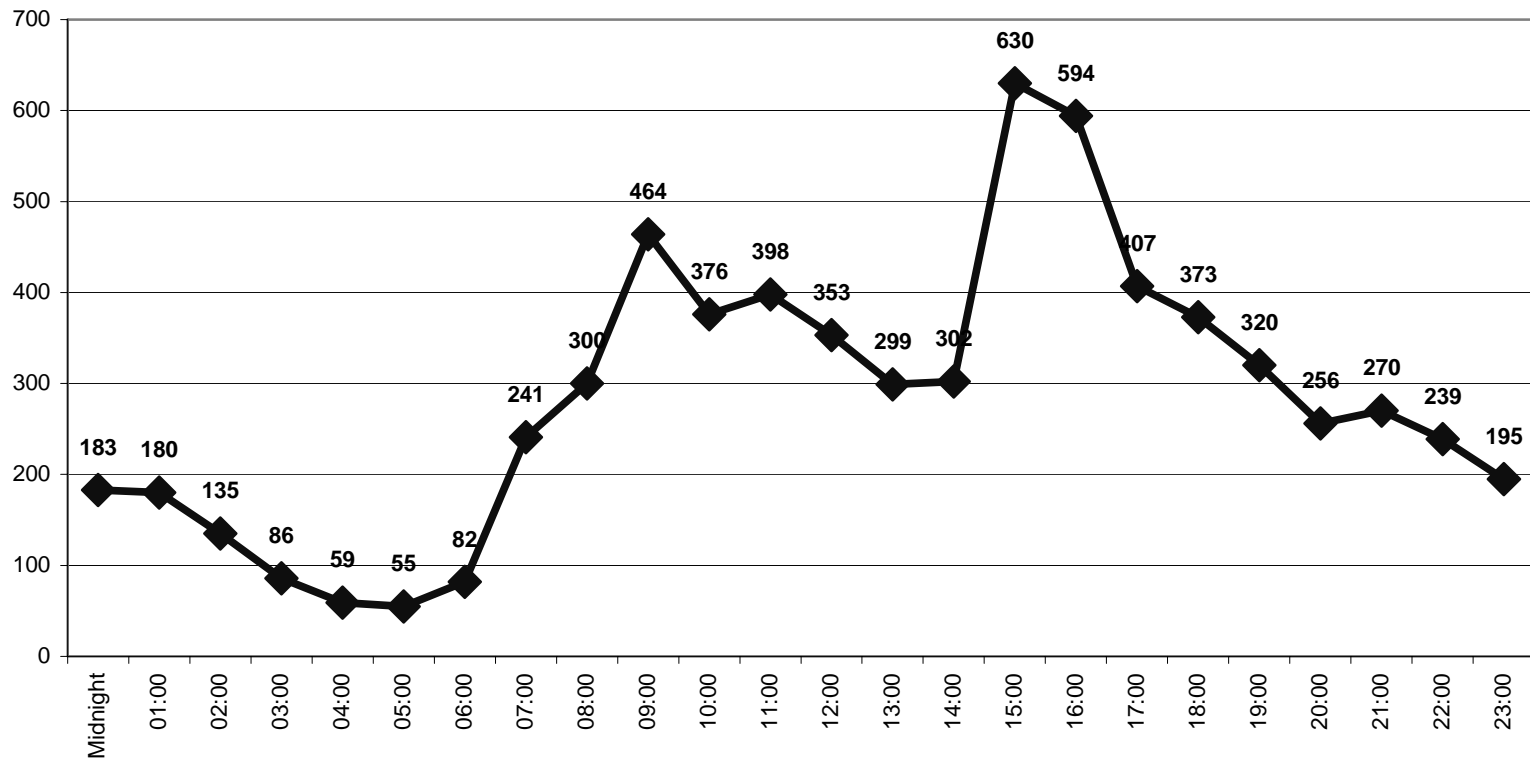

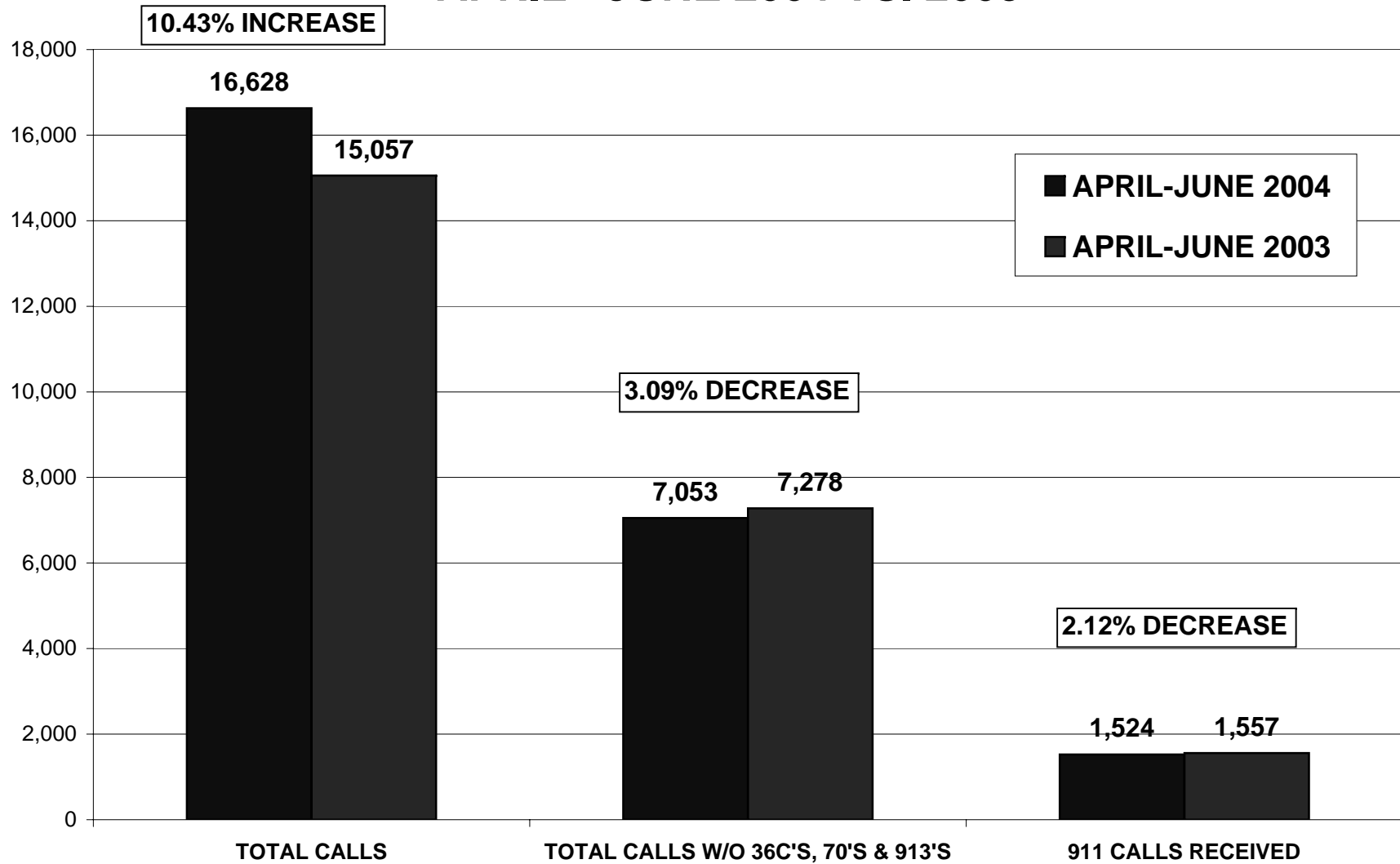
# ***Calls for Service by Time of Day April - June 2004***

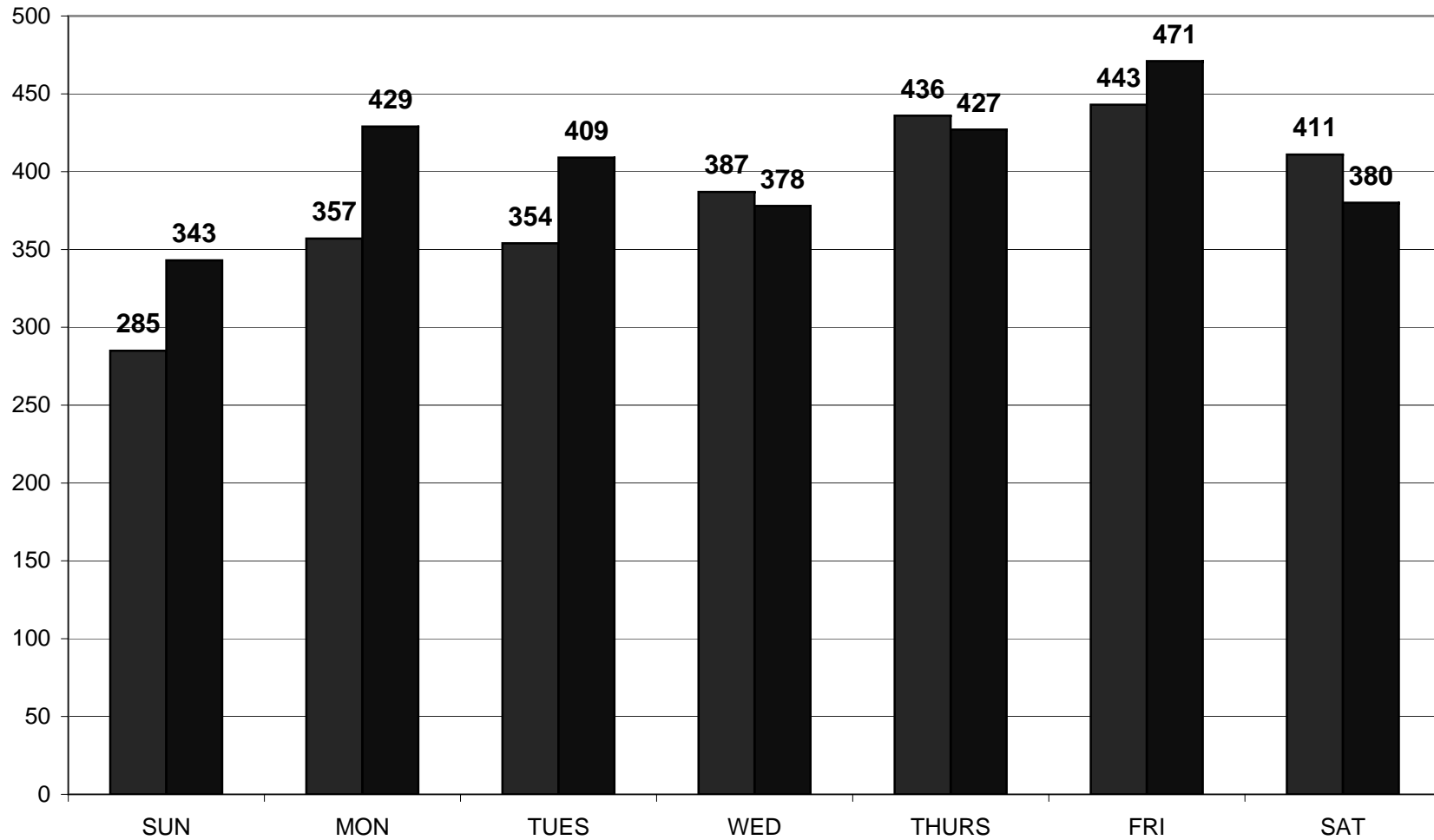

# Calls for Service - First Shift April - June 2004 vs. 2003

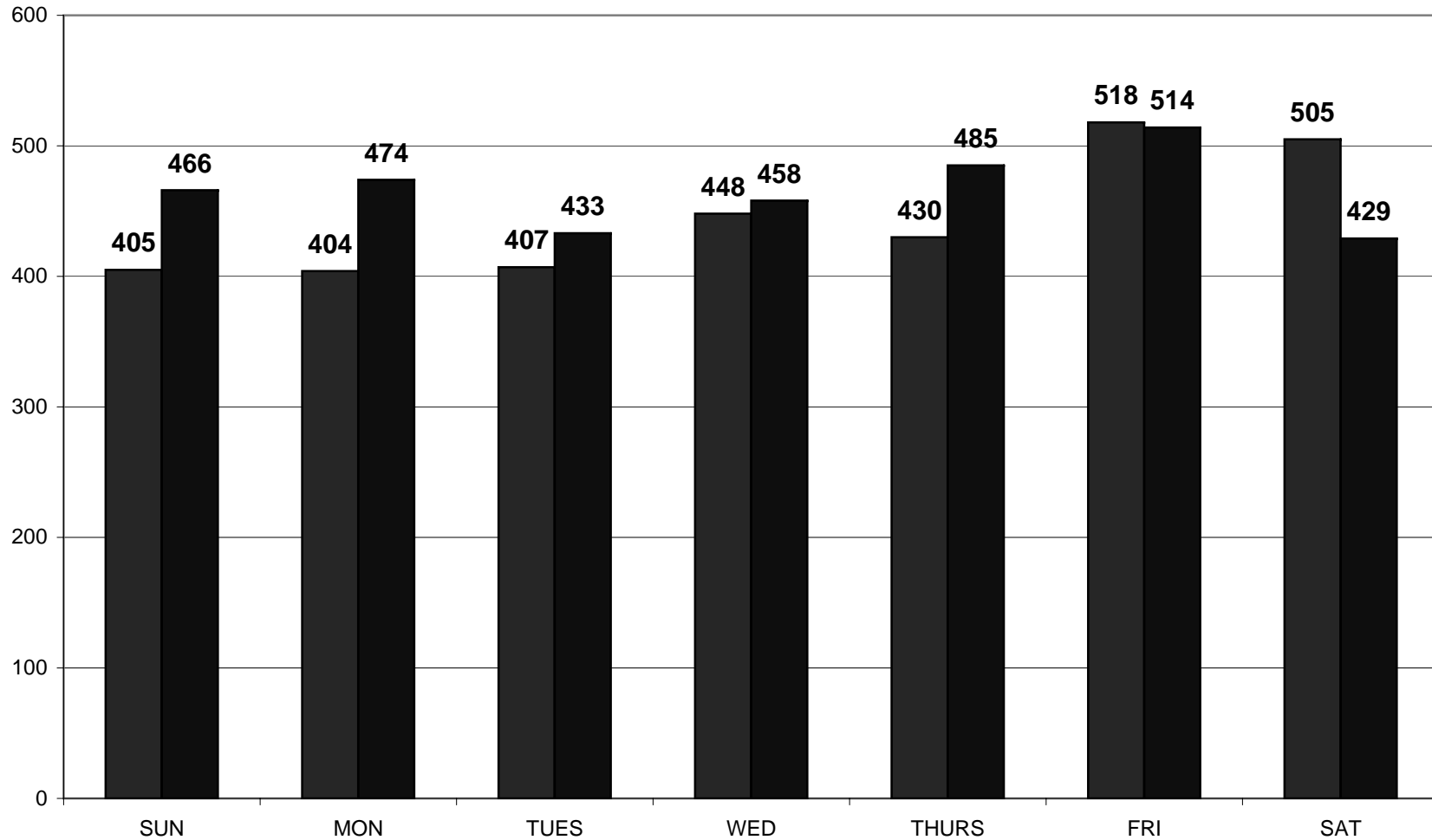

# Calls for Service - Second Shift April - June 2004 vs. 2003

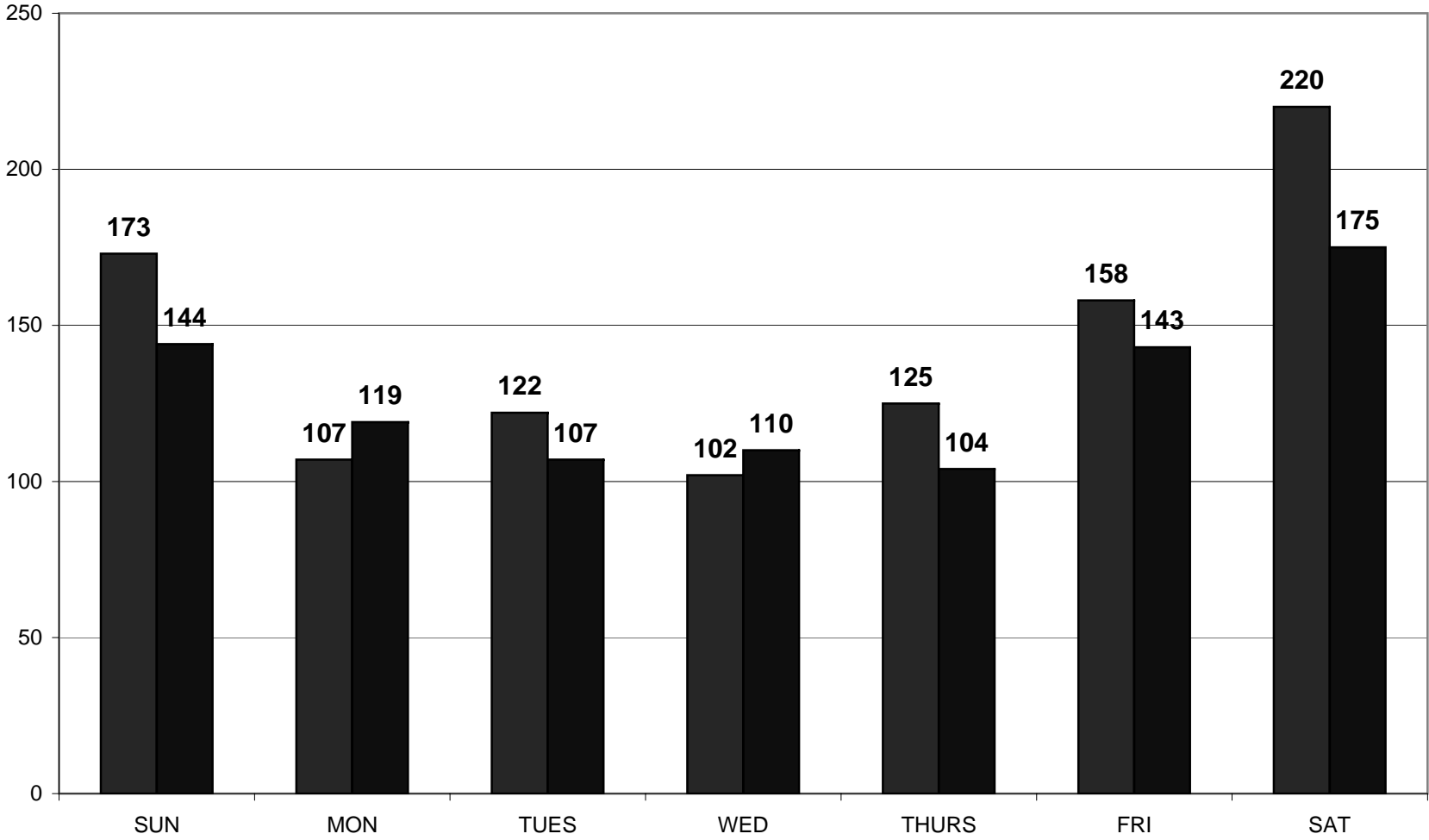

## ACCIDENT ANALYSIS

### April – June 2004

April 1, 2004 through June 30, 2004 there were 239 reported traffic accidents, resulting in an average 2.63% accidents/day. Compared to 2003, accidents increased .84% (2004 = 239; 2003 = 237).

Personal injury accidents (66) accounted for 28% of the total. Property damage accidents accounted for the majority of our activity with 147 reports (61%) being filed. Private property collisions accounted for 26 (11%) reports being filed.

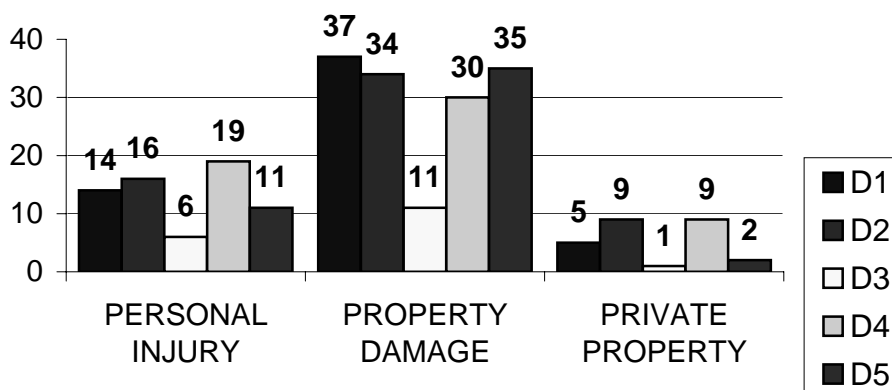
District 2 experienced the majority of accidents (59 or 25%). The second district with the most activity was District 4 (58 accidents or 24%). There were 56 collisions in District 1 (23%), 18 collisions in District 3 (8%) and in District 5, 48 accidents (20%). The busiest day of the week for accident activity for the reporting period was Tuesday with 50 accidents (21%) reported. The second busiest day was Wednesday with 44 accidents (18%) reported. Accident activity for the remaining days of the week are as follows: Sunday = 14 (6%), Monday = 33 (14%); Thursday = 33 (14%); Friday = 42 (17%); and Saturday = 23 (10%).

The most frequent contributing factor was Following Too Closely, which accounted for 82 or 34% of the accidents. The next most recurrent contributing factor was Failure to Control accounting for 29 or 12% of the accidents for the reporting period. The busiest time of day for accident activity was between 5PM – 6PM with 42 (18%) accidents.

Two (2) crashes were identified as having been alcohol related (.84%). The drivers in these accidents were arrested and charged with OMVI. One hundred seventy-five (175) citations were issued to at fault drivers as a result of their accidents (74%).

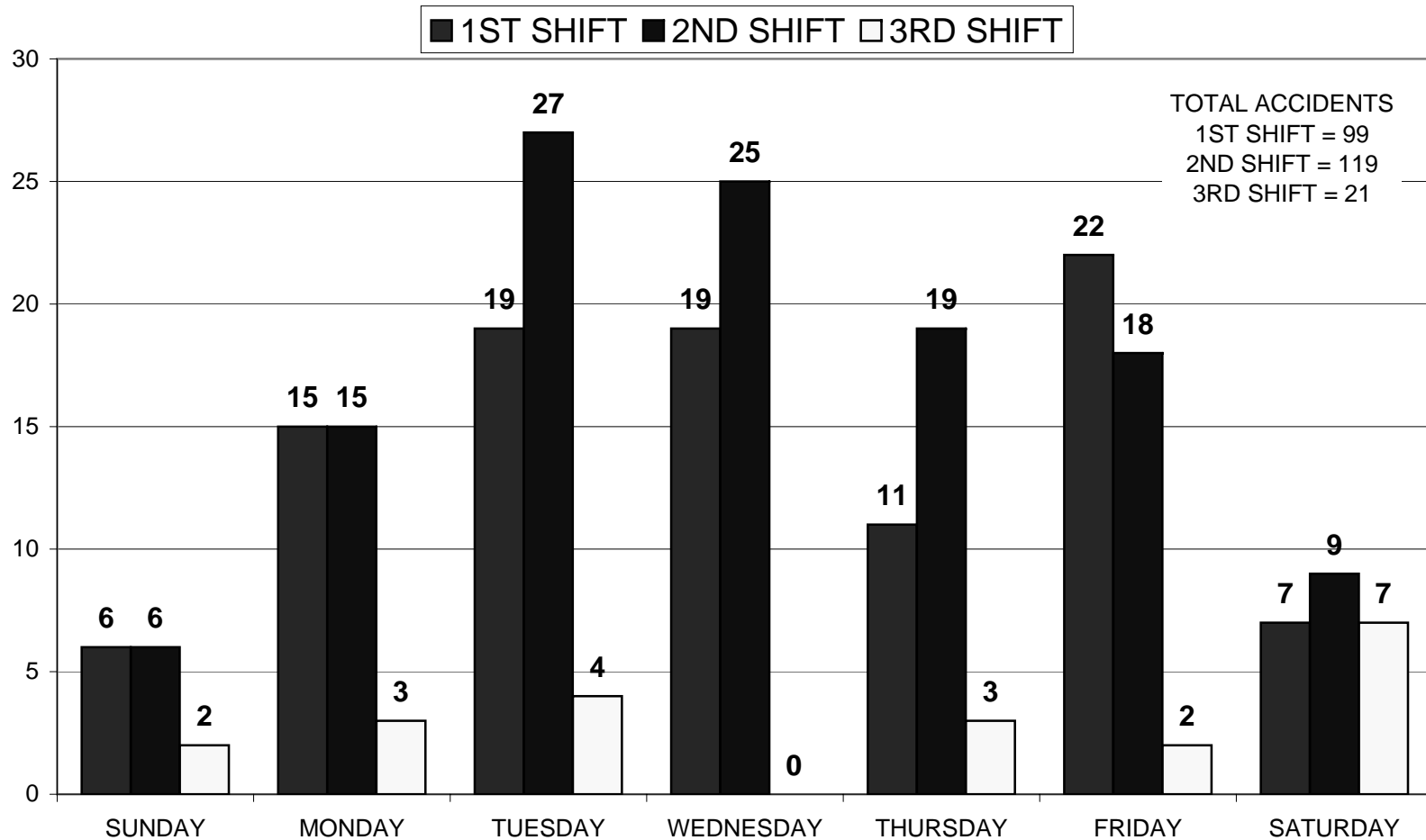

# ACCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK & SHIFT

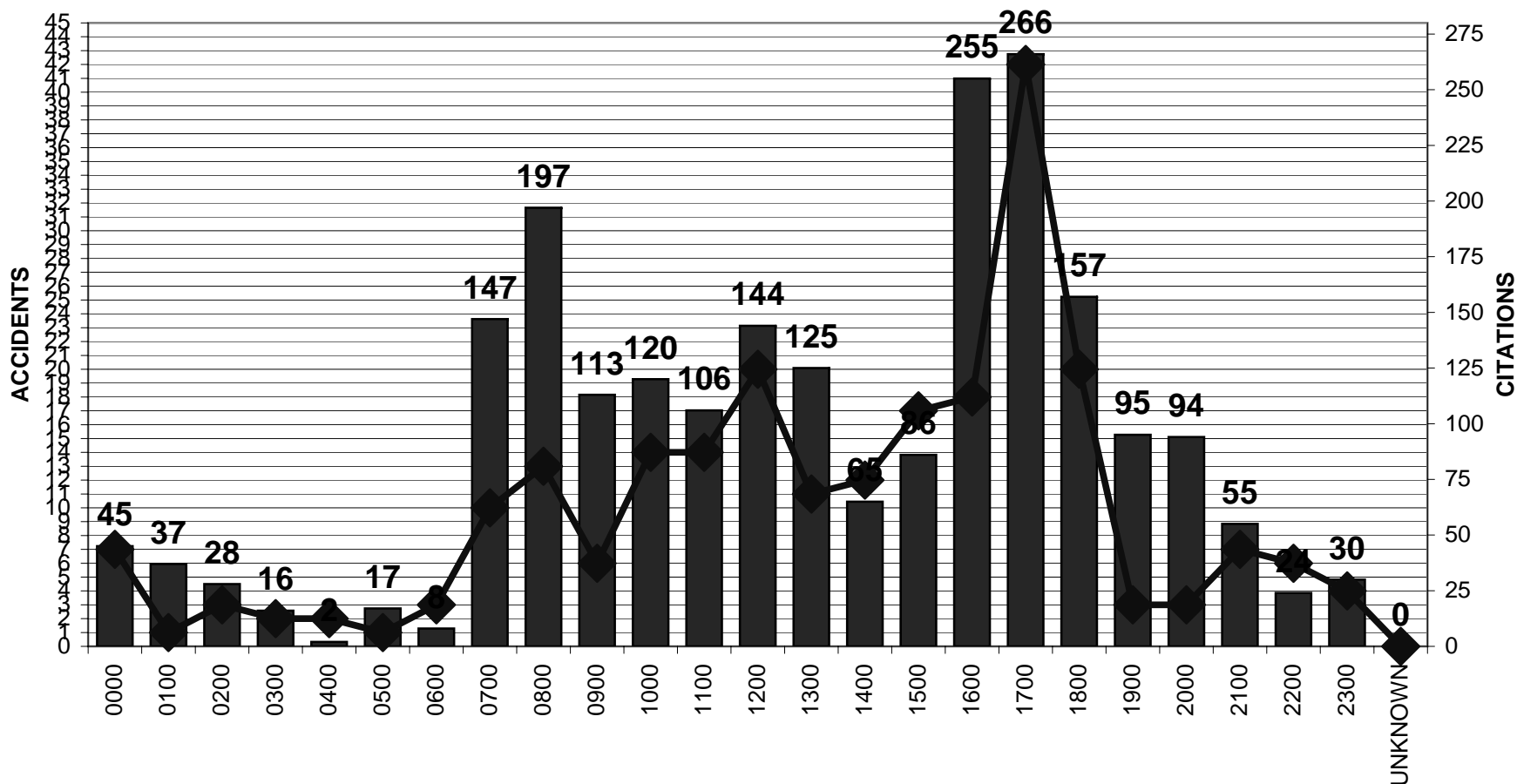

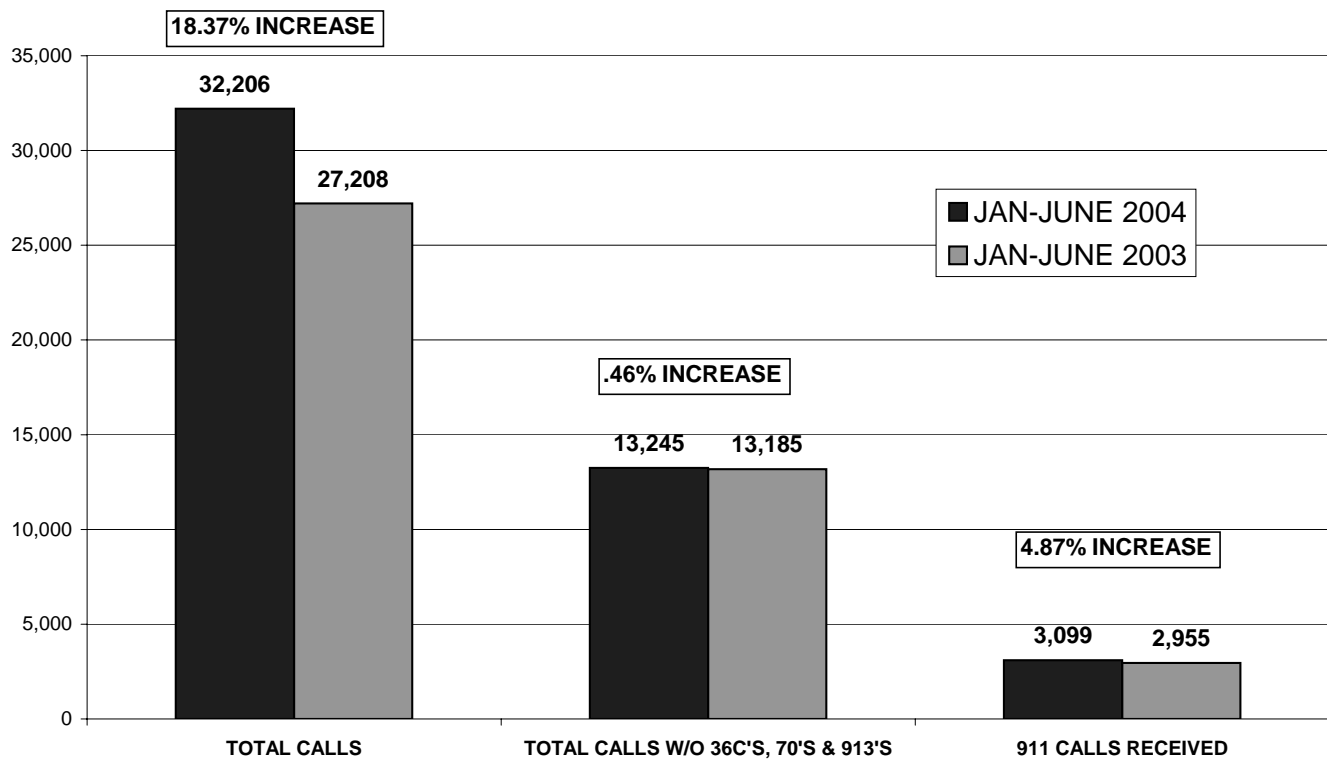

# WORKLOAD ANALYSIS REPORT

## January - June 2004

The January through June 2004 Workload Analysis reflects a total of 12,767 calls for service. This figure does not include traffic stops, foot patrols or courtesy cards initiated by officers or activity occurring in District 0 (calls outside city limits/mutual aid). The average response time for calls was five (5) minutes from the time the call was received by our communications technician until the first responding officer arrived on the scene. The average time to reach a disposition and clear the call was nineteen (19) minutes.

The Workload Analysis also allows us to track activity levels by hour by day. We analyze this data to determine our staffing levels for patrol shifts. By reviewing our Workload Analysis Graph on the following page, you can see that our busiest hour of activity was between 4PM and 5PM. One thousand one hundred sixty-seven (1,167) calls for service were received during this time frame. The next busiest hour was between 3PM and 4PM when one thousand one hundred forty-two (1,142) calls for service were received. The ability to obtain this type of data is critical to effectively staff our patrol shifts.

While reviewing this report it is important to note that various factors can influence average response times. "Stacking" of calls where lower priority calls are held so that calls of a more urgent nature can be dispatched and responded to commonly occurs. "Cross dispatching" where an officer is dispatched out of district to a call will also increase response time. Low priority calls that are received during roll call/shift change negate an immediate response from patrol officers thus increasing response times.

As a matter of practice, we like to keep our average response time for all calls occurring inside the City under ten (10) minutes. As previously stated, there are certain incidents where that becomes impossible. However, our goal is realistic and as demonstrated by the January through June 2004 report, was met. The following is a break down of calls for service by district with the overall total calls, average response time and average time to resolve the call:

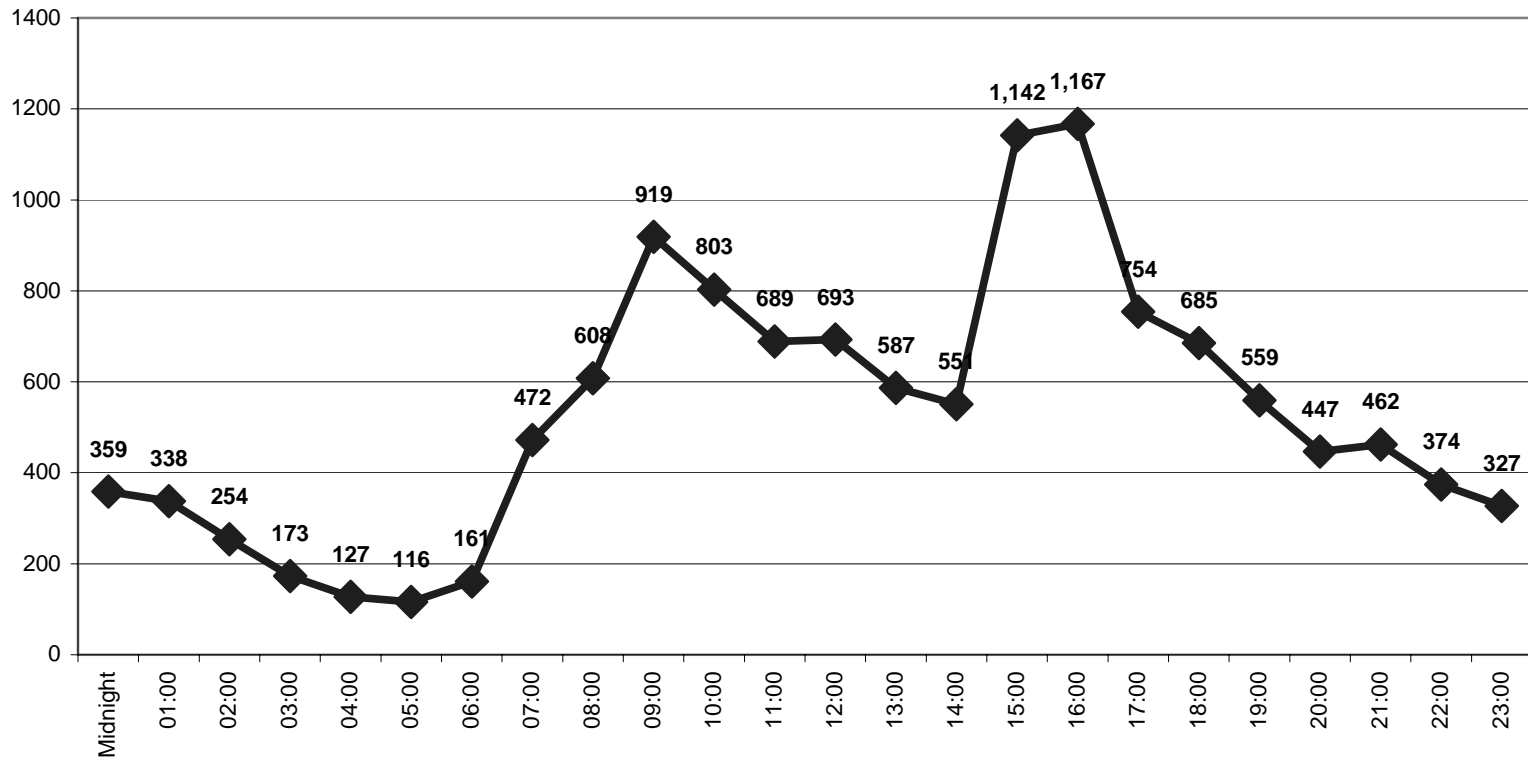

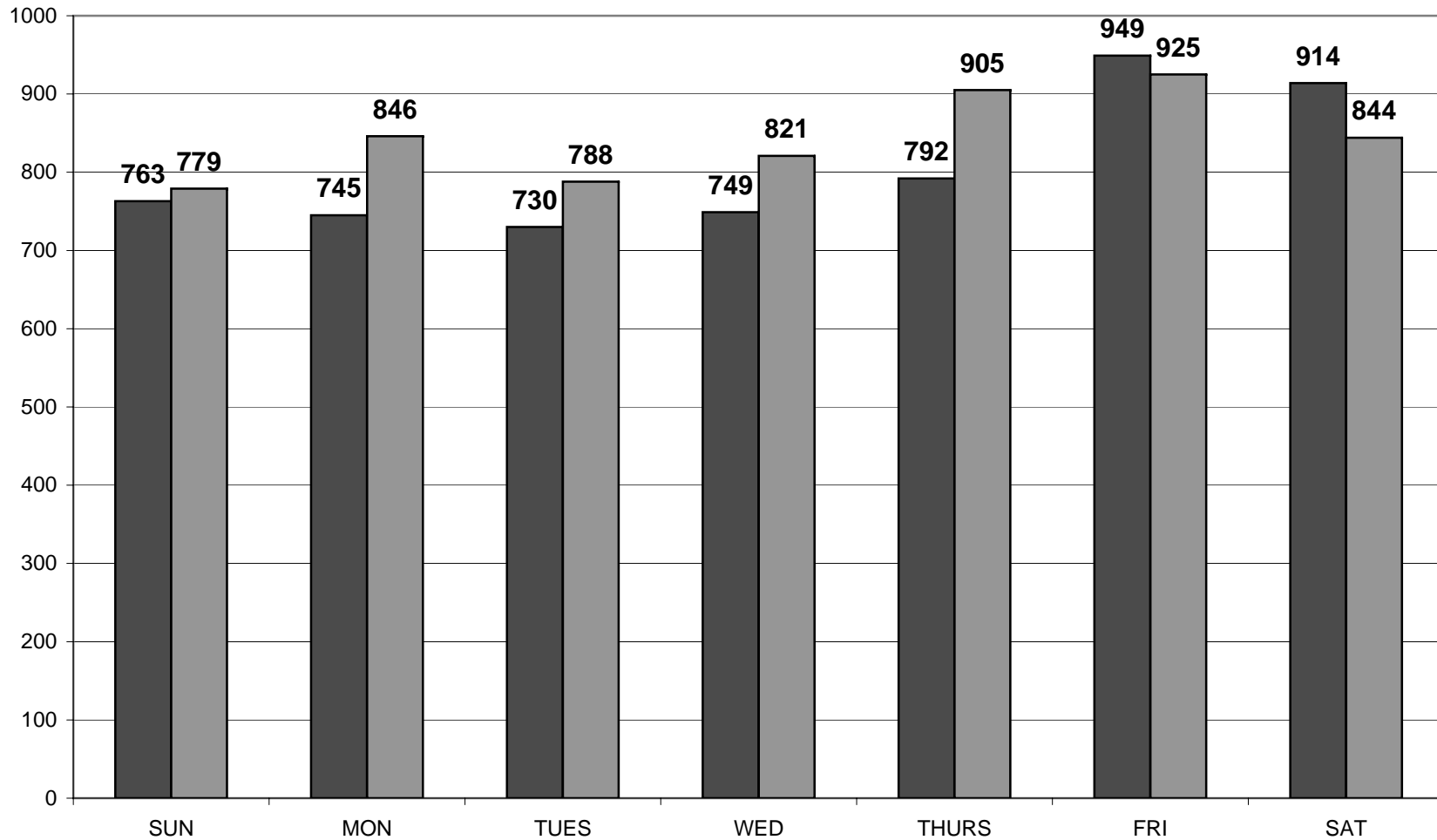
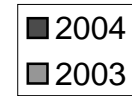

# Calls for Service - First Shift January - June 2004 vs. 2003



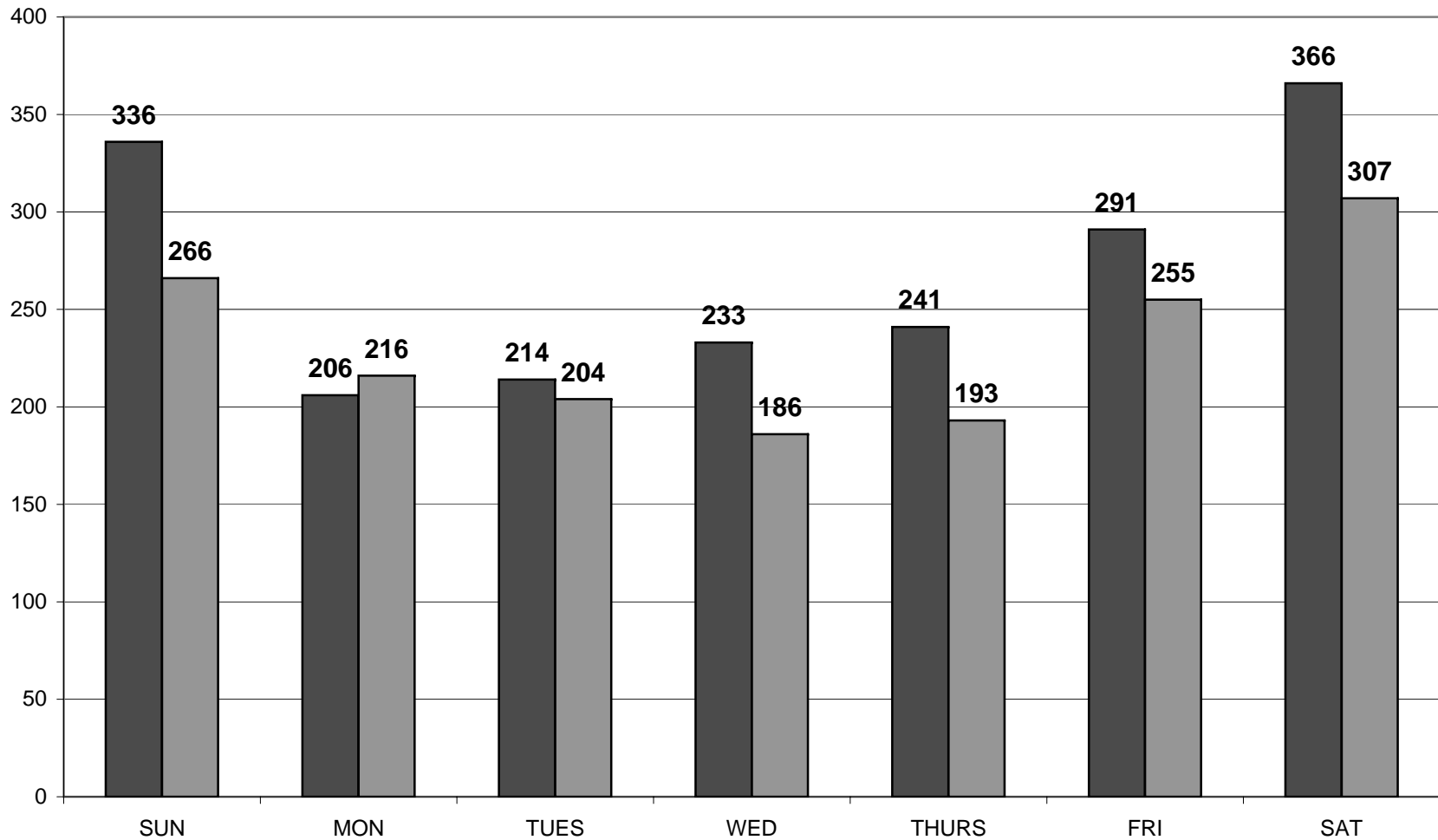
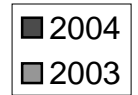

## **ACCIDENT ANALYSIS**

### **January – June 2004**

January 1, 2004 through June 30, 2004 there were 444 reported traffic accidents, resulting in an average 2.44 accidents/day. Compared to 2003, accidents decreased 3% (2004 = 444; 2003 = 459).

Personal injury accidents accounted for 105 (24%) of the total. Property damage accidents accounted for the majority of our activity with 285 reports (64%) being filed. Private property collisions accounted for 54 (12%) reports being filed.

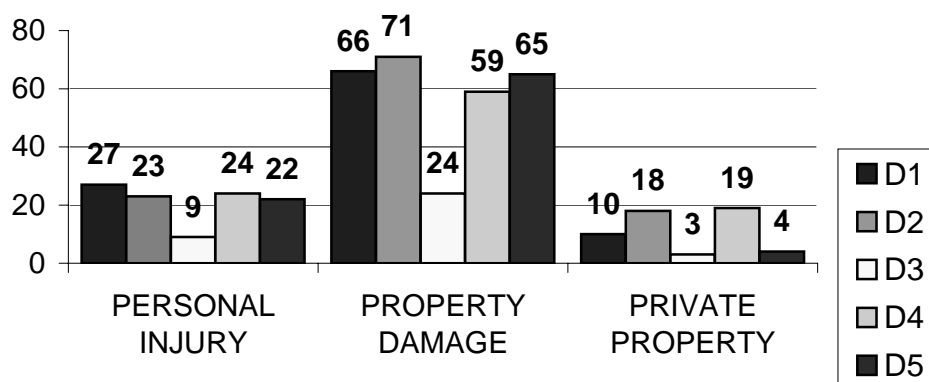
District 2 experienced the majority of accidents (112 or 25%). The second district with the most activity was District 1 (103 accidents or 23%). There were 36 collisions in District 3 (8%), 102 collisions in District 4 (23%) and in District 5, 91 accidents (20%). The busiest day of the week for accident activity for the reporting period was Friday with 86 accidents (19%) reported. The second busiest day was Tuesday with 83 accidents (19%) reported. Accident activity for the remaining days of the week are as follows: Sunday = 31 (7%), Monday = 67 (15%); Wednesday = 79 (18%); Thursday = 58 (13%); and Saturday = 40 (9%).

The most frequent contributing factor was Following Too Closely which accounted for 139 or 31% of the accidents. The next most recurrent contributing factor was Failure to Control accounting for 63 or 14% of the accidents for the reporting period. The busiest time of day for accident activity was between 5PM – 6PM with 64 accidents or 14%.

Four (4) crashes were identified as having been alcohol related (.90%). The drivers in these accidents were arrested and charged with OMVI. Three hundred twenty-four (324) citations were issued to at fault drivers as a result of their accidents (73%).

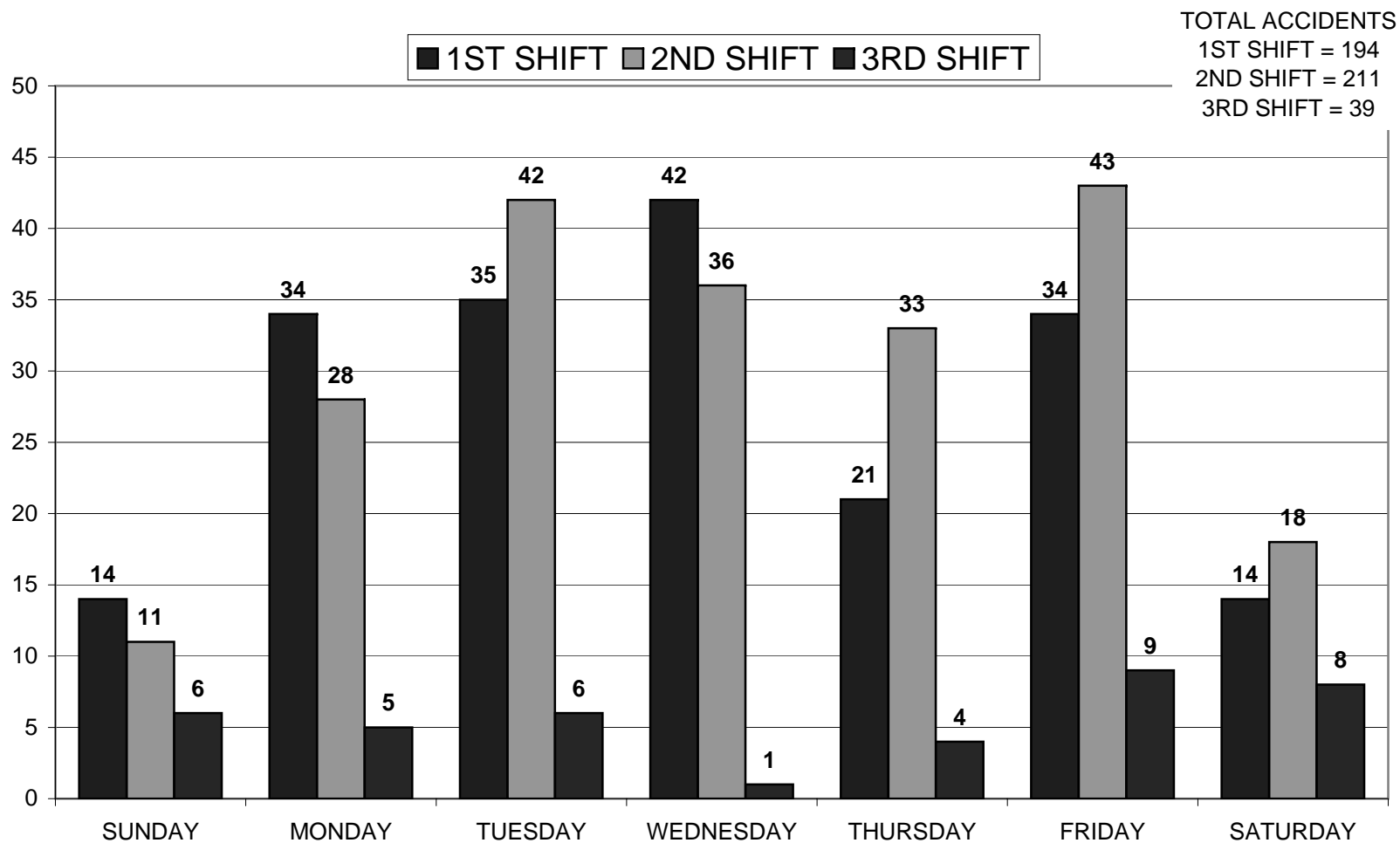

# ACCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK & SHIFT

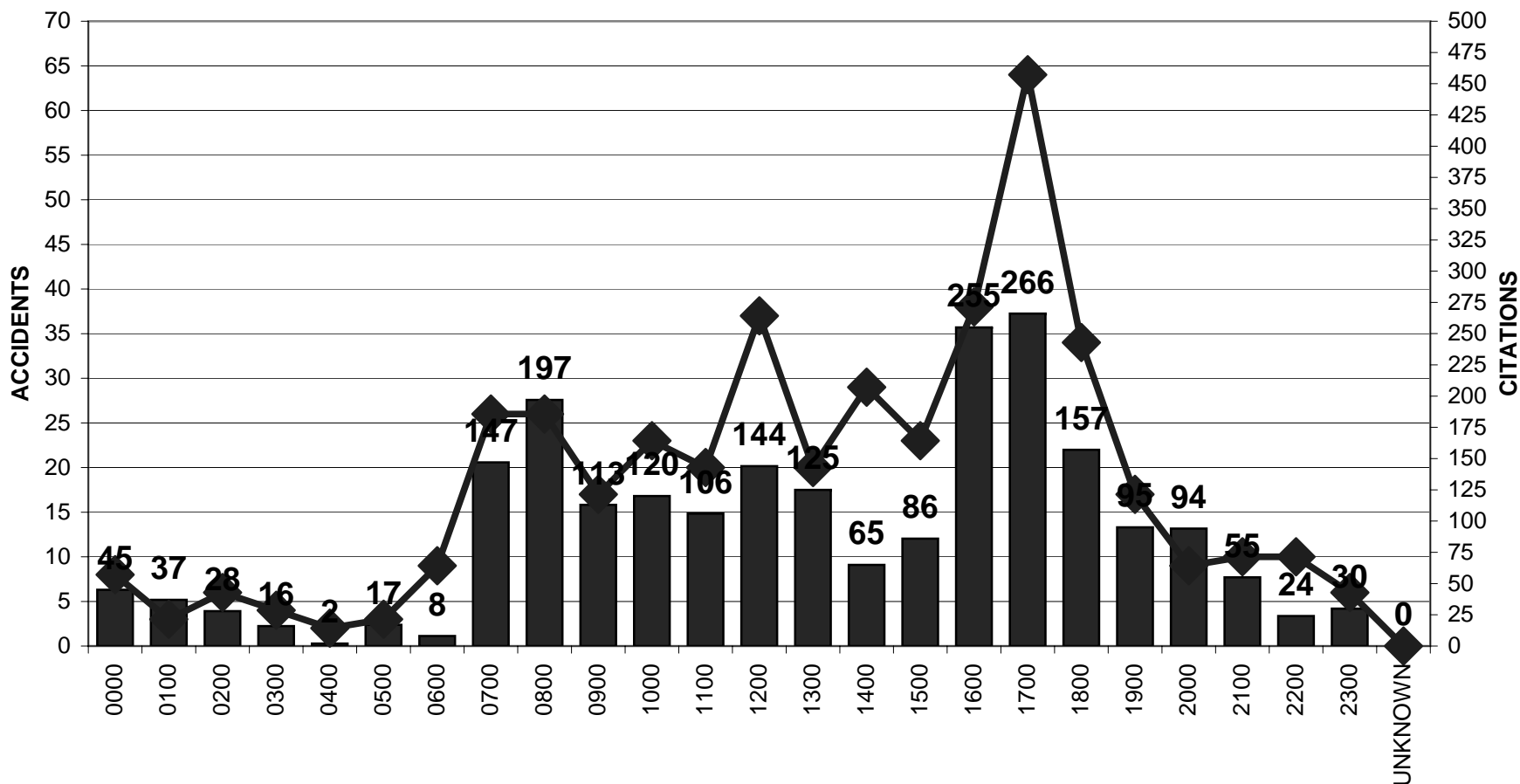

# DIVISION ACTIVITY

## Goals & Objectives Progress

### January – June 2004

*Improve traffic safety throughout the city by reducing traffic crashes and effectively responding to other traffic concerns.*

#### OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES

- **2004-101** Reduce traffic crashes in the top 7 areas over 2003 statistics.

*Accomplished: Between January 1<sup>st</sup> and May 31<sup>st</sup>, overall traffic crashes have decreased by 10.8% (388 in 2003 and 346 in 2004). Between January 1<sup>st</sup> and May 31<sup>st</sup>, traffic crashes in the top seven areas have decreased by 12% (150 in 2003 and 132 in 2004)*

- **2004-102** Reduce speeds in those neighborhoods where traffic enforcement is warranted or implemented.

*Accomplished: Reduced in the following areas:*

- *Holt Drive from 3/23/04 to 5/25/04*
  - *Average speed reduced by 10.4%*
  - *Average 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed reduced by 6.9%*
  - *Number of vehicles greater than 15mph over posted speed limit was reduced by 47.7%*
- *Norn/Blunden from 3/30/04 to 4/29/04*
  - *Average speed reduced by 5.5%*
  - *Average 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed reduced by 3.3%*
  - *Number of vehicles greater than 15mph over posted speed limit was reduced by 92.5%*
- *Chippenham Dr./Sandwich Ct. from 12/2/03 to 2/5/04*
  - *Average speed reduced by 13.5%*
  - *Average 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed reduced by 14.7%*
  - *Number of vehicles greater than 15mph over posted speed limit was reduced by 100%*
- *US 33 (School Zone) from 10/15/03 to 3/4/04*
  - *Average speed reduced by 5.9%*
  - *Average 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed reduced by 4.3%*
  - *Number of vehicles greater than 15mph over posted speed limit was reduced by 38.9%*

- **2004-103** Participate in traffic safety campaigns and strategies addressed toward improving public safety.

**Accomplished:** *Dublin Police participated in the following traffic safety campaigns/strategies:*

- *Operation Safe Commute (3/1/04-4/30/04); Speed and crash reduction on I270 between US 33 and SR 23*
- *Bicycle Safety Rodeo (5/15/04)*
- *“What’s Holding You Back?” (5/24/04-6/6/04); Seatbelt Safety Campaign*
- *Made forty-four O.V.I. arrests (1/1/04-5/31/04)*
- *Plan on participating in “You Drink, You Drive, You Lose” Campaign (8/27/04-9/12/04)*

- **2004-104** Conduct traffic counts to create a traffic index for benchmarking our traffic activities.

**Not Accomplished:** *No action taken on this objective. However, Sgt. Gozowski did identify a flaw in the Stealthstat system when conducting an analysis (Martin Rd.) along with a city engineer sponsored traffic count. When vehicle speeds decrease below 15-20mph and then speed up again, the system counts the vehicle twice because the system loses the vehicle when speeds dip down below 15-20mph. The TEU will monitor this based on the area and speed problem.*

#### **SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-105** Develop educational initiatives to reduce the frequency and severity of accidents involving 16 to 18 year-olds.

**Pending:** *As of June, the high school SRO’s were developing modifying a lesson plan for sophomores for the 2004-2005 school year to address most frequently cited causes for accidents involving drivers between the ages of sixteen to eighteen. Also as of June, the CEU members have been preparing to develop and implement a juvenile traffic diversion program with the City’s juvenile diversion officer. As part of the diversion, juvenile traffic offenders will have to attend driver’s education courses and safety classes.*

#### **OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-201** Reduce the number of thefts from vehicles over 2003 statistics.

**Accomplished:** *Thefts from vehicles were reduced by 39% (78 in 2004 and 128 in 2003)*

- **2004-202** Reduce the number of burglaries and B&E’s over 2003 statistics.

**Accomplished:** *Burglaries and B&E’s have been reduced by 30.6% (43 in 2004- and 62 in 2003)*

- **2004-203** Increase the number of arrests for property crime offenses.

**Not Accomplished:** *No change from 2003 to 2004 (32 arrests each year)*

- **2004-204** Increase the percentage of property crime solved by arrest over 2003 statistics.

***Not Accomplished:** In 2004, ten property crime investigations have been cleared by arrest compared to 24 property crimes investigations cleared by arrest in 2003. Due to the low figures at this time, percentage comparison would be an inaccurate performance measure.*

- **2004-205** Proactively interact with the community to educate them about on-going crime issues and crime prevention strategies.

***Accomplished:** The department has consistently been involved in proactive interaction within the community since the beginning of 2004 through May 31<sup>st</sup>. Law Enforcement personnel attended thirteen Neighborhood Watch/Civic Association meetings; have participated in the on-going Anti-Theft Sticker Campaign (target hotels/motels); have had several community awareness articles written in local newspaper/s; and have conducted the following:*

- o 2,874 Crime Prevention Notices (36C's)
- o 5,594 Business Checks (913's)
- o 2,340 Vacation House Watches (61's)
- o 4,160 Directed Patrols (61B's)
- o 545 Suspicious Person Contacts
- o 376 Suspicious Vehicle Contacts

### **SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-206** Develop methods to prevent and interdict thefts in all middle and high schools in the district.

***Accomplished:** The SRO's at both high schools and selected middle schools initiated proactive programs to address theft problems which, in turn, have helped to reduce thefts as of the end of May. (Schools experienced a 240% increase in theft offenses in the first six months of the school year, compared to the previous school year.) Methods used included: posting signs in locker rooms, classrooms, and other areas where thefts occurred that reminded students and staff to lock up belongings; 36C's in parking lots; extra patrol of lots; and, increased hall presence. Thefts dropped from ten in February to five in March; five in April to two in May.*

- **2004-207** Link crime prevention education efforts to crime analysis data to reduce targeted crimes.

***Accomplished:** Including the previously met objective (2004-206), monthly crime information and police activity is being relayed to all neighborhood watch liaisons. The first Neighborhood Watch Newsletter will be sent out in mid-July.*

**Successfully integrate technology to improve operational efficiency and effectiveness.**

### **OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-301** Implement and utilize the field-reporting project during 2004.

**Pending:** Currently, CS Somerville and Officer T. Evans are working on the project. The aim is to roll it out to dayshift patrol officers for field demo use sometime in July. Project goal is full patrol implementation by October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2004.

- **2004-302** Implement and utilize the looking glass software for crime analysis purposes in 2004.

#### **OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-401** Implement the mobile command post trailer in 2004.

**Pending:** Specifications drawn up and forwarded to procurement for bidding.

- **2004-402** Implement the prisoner transport van in 2004.

**Accomplished:** Project completed. Policy draft is pending.

- **2004-403** Conduct tabletop exercises to better prepare and plan for critical incidents.

**Not Accomplished:** No action taken.

- **2004-404** Implement officer safety equipment and training for response to a critical incident.

**Accomplished:** First responder kits have been issued to all sworn personnel. New gas masks have not been distributed as of yet. Policy and training are pending. The Ballistic helmet and body armor have been distributed for patrol use. Policy completed. Training in progress.

- **2004-405** Conduct quarterly audits of specified equipment to determine the number of defects (equipment malfunctioning, missing, broken, etc.) and then systematically eliminate the defects so they can get as close to “zero defects” as possible.

**Accomplished:** (4/1/04) Lt. Hirschy conducted an audit/inspection on the Truck 9 crash/crime scene evidence vehicle. It was discovered that a few pieces of equipment were missing or not in operational order. Issue was corrected. (5/11/04) Det. Sgt. Hungler conducted an inspection of Truck 9 and found all equipment to be present and functional.

#### **SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-406** Plan and support a critical incident/disaster drill for Division.

**Pending:** Planning will begin in August for a Fall exercise.

**Improve the internal operational culture within the Police Division.**

#### **OPERATIONS BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-501** Celebrate and recognize our policing successes.

**Accomplished:** Officer Stoll won the Caswell Challenge at the 2004 ASLET Conference. A formal presentation and media release is pending Caswell's site visit. In March, Officer Rudy presented the City with the "Above and Beyond" Award.

- **2004-502** Implement various "team activities" to assist in improving the culture in the operations bureau.

**Accomplished:** A third-shift potluck was held; Traffic Safety Committee formed; and the "Dayshift roll-call experiment" was conducted.

#### **SERVICES BUREAU OBJECTIVES**

- **2004-503** Develop and implement methods to solicit and utilize input from team members.

**Pending:** CEU members have been tasked with proposing an additional module of training in the Division's F.T.O. program that addresses the CEU functions of DARE and SRO.
